

Ione Lady Cards lose to Condon

Ahead through half-time, the Lady Cardinals lost it in the third and fourth quarters to the bigger numbers of the Condon bench, 48-38.

The Blue Devils, led by Kacee Kennedy with 11 points, scored 23 points in the third quarter by converting on Ione fouls. The Ione team held the first-ranked Class 1A team to six field goals before the second half, but gave the Blue Devils 24 attempts from the charity stripe from which they made 16.

Brenda Burright led Ione with a game-high 15 points, but couldn't lift the Cards any farther.

"They got hot from the field in the third quarter and we committed some fouls that they converted on," said coach Dana Heideman. "That was the difference in the

game—they had a high shooting percentage and went to the free throw line more than we did."

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New vaccine requirements to be instituted state-wide

The Oregon Health Division has filed administrative rules adding vaccination requirements for Oregon's children and adolescents, health officials have announced.

"These new requirements reflect the fact that the standard immunization schedule for kids has changed," says Dr. David Fleming, M.D., state epidemiologist. "New vaccines are now available and routinely given, and Oregon's school requirements need to reflect these advances."

The rules add requirements for attendance in kindergarten, children's facilities, and seventh grade, as follows:

School entry (kindergarten): starting school year 1998/99 Hepatitis B, 1998/99 second dose of measles-containing vaccine, 2000/01 varicella (chickenpox); children's facilities: 1998/99 Hepatitis B, 2000/01 varicella; seventh grade requirements: 2000/01 Hepatitis B, second dose measles-containing vaccine and varicella.

"Children need shots to stay healthy. To stay in school in Oregon, state law requires evidence of vaccination or appropriate exemptions," says Karin Romey, public health education at the Health Division. Children must still show proof of vaccination for diphtheria, tetanus, polio, measles, mumps, rubella and Haemophilus influenzae type b (Hib), as well as the new vaccines.

Children who have had chickenpox disease will not need the vaccine. However, parents will need to sign a statement verifying their child had the disease.

This is the first time Oregon has immunization requirements

specific to adolescents. Beginning school year 2000/2001, those in seventh grade will need documentation of shots against Hepatitis B, a second dose of a measles-containing vaccine and varicella (chickenpox) vaccine or the appropriate exemptions.

Children needing shots should go to their regular doctor, nurse or health clinic. If they do not have a health care provider, they may call 1-800-SAFENET (1-800-723-3638). Anyone wanting information about the new law should call Romey at (503) 731-3418.

The Morrow County Health Dept. is offering free varicella (chickenpox) vaccine at all of their clinics through Thursday, Feb. 12. The Heppner office is open Thursdays from 8:30 a.m.-noon and 1-4:30 p.m. The Boardman office is open Tuesday from 9:30 a.m.-noon and 1-4 p.m.

Laura McElligott, R.N. Morrow County Health Dept. director, said that Hepatitis A vaccine is also now available at a cost of \$38.50 for adults and \$17.50 for children 2-18 years old.

MC fairgrounds work day set

A work day has been scheduled for this Saturday, February 7, starting at 7:30 a.m. to prepare the Morrow County Fairgrounds multi-purpose building site. Work will include clearing trees and removing dug-outs and fences and numerous other projects so the county road department can start doing the ground preparations.

Approximately \$16 million will be awarded to Oregon non-metropolitan cities and counties in 1998. The maximum grant that a city or county can receive is \$750,000.

The state will accept applications in April, 1998 for competitive category projects, including Community Facilities, Handicapped Accessibility and Housing Rehabilitation. Applications for Public Works projects are taken all year.

A public hearing will be held by the Heppner City Council at 7:00 pm on Monday, February 9, 1998, at City Hall, 188 W. Willow Street.

The purpose of this hearing is for the City Council to obtain citizen views and to respond to proposals and questions about:

- Community development and housing needs, especially the needs of low and moderate income persons, as well as other needs in the community that might be assisted with a Community Development Block Grant project.

- The performance of City in carrying out its community development responsibilities.

Written comments are also welcome and must be received by Monday, February 9, 1998, at 5:00 pm, at City Hall, 188 W. Willow Street. Both oral and written comments will be considered by the City Council in deciding whether to apply.

A second public hearing will be held prior to completion of an application for a specific project. The location of the hearing is accessible to persons with disabilities. Please let Heppner City Hall at 676-9618 know if you will need any special accommodations to attend or participate in the meeting.

More information about Oregon Community Development Block Grants and records about the City's past use of Community Development Block Grant funds is available for public review at Heppner City Hall, 188 W. Willow Street during regular office hours. Advance notice is requested. If special accommodations are needed, please notify Heppner City Hall at 676-9618 so that appropriate assistance can be provided.
