

## Grange meeting held

Pomona Grange met at Spray Grange for the regular meeting on Saturday, with the Wheatland Pomona master presiding.

The ag. report was given by Wilma Martin, who told the group that the price of wheat is the lowest that it has been for years. The Wheat League recently sent a delegation to Washington D.C. to tell of the farmer's dilemma. There was also much discussion on the initiatives passed by the legislature. Citizens have no knowledge of them until they become a law, and need more information about the things that go on at the legislature that need to be discussed by the voters before passed.

The right of prayer for ill children was discussed concerning the fact that there are many parents that do not take their children to a physician and the children sometimes die because they weren't taken to a hospital or physician.

There was much discussion on the need for young farmers to keep abreast of farming problems and one way is to attend the Grange, which is a legislative body. Grange also has a man at the sessions in Salem to keep abreast of matters.

There was some discussion brought about the degree work of the order. The people who join and are obligated are given one year to take the four degrees, following this not taken can be dropped by the subordinates.

The cakewalk was enjoyed after which the program was given, which was a report on the newly organized fire district for the Spray area. There are training ses-

sions each week for the fighters and the maintenance of the equipment. The fire district has been recognized by the state of Oregon. It is financed by money makers and grants. One of the money makers will be a ducky derby to be held July 11 at 11 p.m. Cost is \$5 per duck. The Wheatland Pomona purchased a duck to enter.

Resolutions included a thank you for Spray for the dinner and hospitality and concerning the drawdown of the Snake and Columbia rivers and how it will affect the farming industry. Both were approved by the order.

A date for the yearly GWA conference was suggested the week of June 7-13. Subordinates will be notified by the Pomona secretary.

The chair of chaplain was declared vacant and Zelma McDaniel was elected to fill the office.

The delivery of the sheaf of grain from Umatilla County was discussed. It will be brought to Lexington Grange Master and Pomona secretary on June 11 and will be taken onto Wasco County on June 13 by Aloha Medlock. This is to be canned food week and non-perishable food will be collected to be taken to the state session.

The Grange has adopted the "Make a Wish Foundation" and abused children projects, which they are helping finance by saving pull tabs from cans.

The next Pomona meeting will be in July at Greenfield Grange. The Pomona secretary will notify the subordinates of the plans later in the year.

## Lone girls tennis team earns honors

The Oregon School Activities Association, along with the Dairy Farmers of Oregon, has announced that the Lone High School girls' tennis team has been included in the spring 1998 academic all-state award winners. The Lone girls' team was first academically in all 3A, 2A and 1A school tennis teams in the state.

The team has a grade-point average of 3.77. Other winners include the Ontario High School orchestra, with a 3.67 grade point average; Crook County High School boys' golf team, 3.68 gpa; Lakeridge High School boys' tennis team, 3.76; Lakeridge High School girls' golf team, 3.81; Santiam Christian High School track and field team, 3.58; Crook County High School baseball team, 3.65; and

Damascus Christian High School softball team, 3.87.

The Lone girls' tennis team will be presented an award on May 23 at the state champion ship.

Schools submitted their team rosters to the OSAA, with each student's grade level and previous semester grades. The grades used to determine athletic eligibility for all high school student athletes are the same grades used to conclude the academic all-state award winners.

The academic all-state award is designed to recognize the top boys' and girls' team in each of the OSAA's sanctioned activities based upon that team's total grade-point average. The top team in each sport or activity will receive a certificate for their achievement and their school will receive a plaque for display.

## BMCC offers placement test sessions

To better serve potential students who work during the day or who are attending high school, Blue Mountain Community College Admissions and Advising staff are offering two evening placement test sessions.

The first session will be held in Pendleton Tuesday, May 19, at 6 p.m. in the Pioneer Hall Counseling Center. The second session will be Thursday, May 21, at 6 p.m. at BMCC's West Campus in Hermiston. Reservations are required for testers. The ASSET placement test is given to help counselor's and advisors assess student ability in reading, writing and math, ensuring that students take the appropriate classes for their skill level. The test is required before students may make a registration appointment.

The placement test is offered on a regular basis each Monday and Thursday at 9 a.m., throughout the year except for major holidays. The test is offered in the Counseling Center in Pioneer Hall. There is a \$ 10 per person charge for the testing service.
