Bert J. Williams, formerly of Heppner, died November 23, 1998, at Silverton. He was 77 years old.

A memorial service for Mr. Williams will be held on Saturday, December 12, 1998 at the New Life Bible Chapel, 510 W. 4th, in Prineville.

Bert Williams was born on August 1, 1921, in Carter County, Missouri. He served in World War II. He was a Heppner resident for several years and later moved to Prineville, where he worked on a ranch for 35 years.

Mr. Williams is survived by daughters Linda Minger, Hillsboro, Marianne Fosmark, Canby, Roberta Cook, Prineville, Bonnie Williams, Sally Williams and Sandi Williams, all of Everett, Washington; and a son, Fred Williams of Everett, Washington; 16 grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

Jack Ball

Ione native Jack Ball, 68, of Walla Walla, Washington, died Thursday, November 26, 1998, at St. Mary Medical Center after a lengthy illness.

At his request, there will be no services. Private family interment has been held.

Mr. Ball was born July 17, 1930, at Ione, to Elmer and Nina Christopherson Ball. He grew up in Ione and attended schools there, then served in the military for a brief time.

On Oct. 5, 1950, he married Margaret E. Shoemaker at Lewiston, Idaho.

He was employed as a forklift driver at the sawmill in Kinzua until 1978 when the mill moved to Heppner. He and his family moved there and he continued working at the mill until his retirement in 1992.

Mr. Ball enjoyed fishing, hunting and going to basketball games. He was a member of the TOC Woodworkers Union.

Survivors include his wife, Margaret "Marge" at the home; sons, Mike of Prineville, Dennis of Fossil and Steven of Lexington; a sister, Freada Bates of Coarsegold, California; a brother, Leon of Heppner; seven grandchildren and one great-grandson. He was preceded in death by his parents.

Russel Irving Temple

Russel Irving Temple, 91, Wallowa, died December 6, 1998.

Russel Irving Temple was born to Howard and Maud Steele Temple on December 15, 1906, in Gallatin County, Missouri. He moved to Ontario, Oregon in 1910 and lived in Fruitland, Idaho, and the Ontario region until his family moved to Molalla in 1927, where he met and married his wife, Rose, in 1935.

In 1938 they moved to Wallowa to the ranch on Powatka Road where they spent the next 60 years. Their three sons-Dick, a veterinarian in Morrow County, Darrel, a research scientist in Stillwater, Oklahoma, and Brian, who is on the home ranch-grew up and attended elementary and high school in Wallowa.

Mr. Temple was baptized into Christ at 16 years of age and has always been active in church. He was a devoted father to his own sons and several foster children through the years. In 1981 he was named the Wallowa County Cowbelles Father of the Year.

He was an honorary member of both FFA and Wallowa County Stock Growers Association and loved training, riding and showing horses. He

enjoyed the Open Class Horse Show sponsored by the Wallowa County Wranglers and one year showed both the grand champion quarter horse stallion and the grand champion quarter horse mare. He led a 4-H horse club for five years and was chairman of horse activities of the Wallowa County Fair. For several years he furnished stock for the junior rodeo. In 1985, he and his wife, Rose, were named "Friends of 4-H".

Mr. Temple loved living in Wallowa County and a very special time for him was taking his sons on pack trips into Wallowa Mountain High Lakes.

Mr. Temple is survived by sons, Dick, Lexington, Darrel, Stillwater, Oklahoma, Brian, Wallowa; nine grandchildren, Ray, David and Kimberly Temple, Bobbi Krob and Ryan Temple; Rusty, Brent, Laurel and Krystal Temple; and two great-grandchildren, Kyra and Brendon Temple. He was preceded in death by his parents, four brothers and one sister.
