County Court hears report on CSEPP exercise

Judge Terry Tallman, at the May 19 meeting of the Morrow County Court, reported on the meeting in which the CSEPP exercise of last week was critiqued by FEMA, and the court approved adding the Boardman and Irrigon fire departments to the list of contracts signed with the county for CSEPP assistance. They approved contracting for up to \$27,000 with Comp View for system integration, deleting the smart board.

The court discussed concerns over the FEMA report with the Emergency Management director, who will write a letter that addresses the concerns. They also discussed the tone alert radios and the question of funds for the distribution of the radios and they approved signing a memorandum of understanding with Umatilla County, giving primary responsibility for activation of the alert and notification systems to Umatilla County.

The court previewed a citizen's proposal of a low-watt radio station in Heppner.

The court approved amending the "Old Growth Diversification Fund Grant Agreement" with OEDD to add the \$500 contribution of OEDD for the labor demographic study.

The court reviewed and approved the new fee schedule, which includes an addition of \$1 to the 32-gallon and minimum-can fees for the transfer station and changes submitted by the health department.

The public hearing on the Goal 5 amendment to the aggregate site inventory continued with input from three citizens. The court voted to deny the Hellberg Goal 5 amendment at this time, agreeing that this is not a compatible use because of the close proximity of a residential area. The judge noted that the county's improperly placed stockpile has been corrected.

The court passed to the planning department a citizen's request for a particular road name.

The court discussed their meeting with the governor's chief of staff. They discussed the Port of Morrow's desire to erect a building at their airport site and the FAA's position on the issue.

The court heard from the county assessor that Assessment and Taxation HB 2139 is not scheduled to be heard by the Senate Revenue Committee, and they signed the assessor's letter to Senator Randy Miller asking that a hearing be scheduled.

Health District Administrator Sheila Dahlman reported to the court that she would like to eventually see all of the health services located in one clinic. She asked if the county would consider locating the Public Health Department in the district's clinic and answered the court's several related questions.

Benton County Commissioner Max Benitz, for the court's consideration, proposed that the two counties have a united approach to the Endangered Species Act and further explained his ideas and concerns.

Judge Tallman, in response to a request that the county reinstall a businesses sign at the Port of Morrow exit, agreed to investigate. The court approved permits to CenturyTel to bury a line on Eightmile, for Redding Road and Hwy. 206, and for Rhea Creek Road; to Umatilla Electric for overhead line for Potlatch on Patterson Ferry Road; to CenturyTel on Road 532. They approved purchasing a crack-sealing machine and a survey laser level.

The court approved a resolution to support the Oregon Business Development Fund Project

proposal by Western Alfalfa, Inc., contingent on county counsel's approval. Western Alfalfa would add about six employees for the sliced-sleeved bale compressing project.

The court approved a memorandum of agreement supporting the district Attorney's domestic violence grant proposal. DA David Allen explained the proposal in detail, including the expansion of the victim's advocate position, and Sheriff Verlin Denton reported that he sees little impact on his department.

Dickensen receives scholarships, awards

Tim Dickenson, Heppner High School senior, has received notice that he has received numerous scholarships and awards, including the Wendy's High School Heisman Award trophy and the OSU Provost's Scholarship, and has been named a Ford Scholar by the Oregon State Scholarship Commission.

As a Provost's Scholar, Dickenson is eligible to receive \$2,400 for four years, for a total of \$9,600 and has an opportunity to participate in the OSU Scholars Program which provides special leadership and service opportunities.

As a Ford Scholar, Dickenson will receive scholarships for approximately 90 percent of his college costs.

Dickenson, who has a 4. grade point average, earlier received a Morrow County Scholarship Trust award.

Dickenson, the 18-year-old son of Steve and Kathi Dickenson, Heppner, has been a member of the Oregon Student Safety on the Move Club, the Outdoor Club and the Wildhorse Club for all four years in high school.

He was a member of National Honor Society his sophomore, junior and senior years and the club's vice president the last two years.

Dickenson was student body

president his senior year, student body vice president his junior year and freshman class president.

He was a member of Drama Club, the yearbook staff and the school newspaper staff his freshman and sophomore years.

Dickenson played varsity baseball all four years of high school, receiving first team all-conference honors his junior and senior years; varsity basketball for three years, receiving first team all-conference honors the last two years; and varsity football three years, being named to the first team all-conference three years and third team all-state his junior year.

Dickenson plans to major in pre-med at Oregon State University, with the goal of becoming a chiropractor.

In the event of inclement weather, the service will be held at the Ione Legion Hall.






