OF LIVESTOCK DISTRICT**

The County Clerk of Morrow County hereby gives notice that the majority of all the votes cast upon the issue is in favor of creation of a livestock district known as "Liberty School Livestock District". On and after the 15 day of June, 2000, it shall be unlawful for the following classes of livestock to be permitted to run at large within the boundaries of the livestock district: animals of the bovine species, horses, mules, asses, sheep, goats, swine and "exotic animals" included, but are not limited to, buffalo, bison, llama, ostrich, emu, or any animal resulting from the crossbreeding thereof, or the crossbreeding of such exotic animals with domestic animals.

ORS 607.045 provides: "No person owning or having the custody, possession or control of an animal of a class of livestock shall permit the animal to run at large or to be herded, pastured or to go upon the land of another in a livestock district in which it is unlawful for such class of livestock to be permitted to run at large." Violation of this statute is an Unclassified Misdemeanor, punishable by a maximum penalty of one year in the county jail and/or a fine in the amount of \$5,000.00.
