The Heppner High School boys' track team earned 11 points at the state 2A track meet held Saturday, May 20, finishing about midway among the schools participating. Oakridge won the boys' meet with 50 points.

The girls' team scored 8-1/2 points, also about midway. Pilot Rock won the meet with 47 points.

In the boys' competition, Heppner's David Piper was second in the high jump with a leap of 6-03. Craig Scott was

sixth in the 300 hurdles with a time of 43.29.

In the girls' competition, Abby Kahl was fifth in the 3,000 with a time of 11:24.91. Trisha Adams was fifth in the 300 hurdles with a time of 48.12 and eighth in the high jump with a leap of 4-08.

Mustangs beat Rockets for state berth

The Heppner Mustang softball team held off the Pilot Rock Rockets to take a 4-3 win at the Eastern Oregon League District play-off game in LaGrande to earn the second seed in the State 2A softball playoffs. It marked the first time for the Mustangs to reach the state playoffs in softball. The Mustangs improved their record to 12-12 on the year.

The Mustangs scored two runs in the first inning as Jesse Kempas was hit by a pitch and Jesse Gutierrez doubled. SanJuanita Elguezabal doubled to score both and give the Mustangs an early 2-0 lead.

The Rockets scored a run in the second to make it 2-1 but the Mustangs came back with a run in the fourth as Leah Denton singled, went to second on an error and came around to score as Charissa Gates reached on an error.

Jenny Patton walked with one out in the fifth, stole second and third and came home on a passed ball to make it 4-1.

The Rockets scored two runs in the seventh and had the tying run on second, but the Mustangs turned a double play and got a strikeout to end the game.

Elguezabal went 2-4 with a double and two RBIs. Marissa McCabe and Denton each went 1-2 and Gutierrez had a double. Shelley Rietmann picked up the win, scattering seven hits while striking out four and walking two.

The Heppner Mustangs ended their softball season with a loss against the Corbett Cardinals, 2-0, in the first round of the State 2A softball playoffs. The game was moved to Reynolds High School in Portland because of a wet field in Corbett.

The Cardinals were threatening in the second inning with runners on second and third with two out, but senior Leah Denton made a nice running catch of a fly ball to short right field to end the inning.

Corbett did score a run in the third on back-to-back doubles.

The Mustangs had their best chance to score in the top of the fourth as Jesse Kempas reached on an error and Marissa McCabe walked with one out. Both run-

ners moved up on a passed ball but two strikeouts ended the rally.

Corbett had a 2-0 lead in the sixth when Kempas lined a single into left field for the Mustangs' only hit of the game.

Shelley Rietmann pitched a good game, allowing just two runs on four hits, but the Mustangs couldn't get the offense going against Corbett's Kaitlin Wilson. Wilson allowed the one hit and one walk while striking out 14.

It marked the final game for seniors Miranda McElligott and Leah Denton. The Mustangs finished their season with a 12-13 record.
