

Mustangs split with Rockets to win CBC East

The pitching of Stefan Matheny and the hitting of Brad Adams gave the Heppner Mustangs a 13-3 win over the Pilot Rock Rockets in the second game of a doubleheader on Friday, May 11, in Pilot Rock. The Rockets had won the first game, 12-6, to set up a title game for the Columbia Basin East division because the Mustangs had won earlier in the season.

By winning the CBC East title, the Mustangs will enter the CBC District championship as the number one seed and will face the CBC West champion Culver Bulldogs in Pendleton on Saturday, May 19, at Bob White Park.

Matheny pitched a complete game, a four-hitter with two strikeouts and just one walk. Adams went four for four at the plate with three homeruns and eight RBIs.

In the first game, the Rockets took a 1-0 lead in the first, but the Mustangs came back to tie it in the top of the second as Billy Gates reached on an error and came around to score on a Travis Bellamy double.

The Rockets scored six runs in the second to take a 7-1 lead. The Mustangs tried to rally in the third as Luke Murray singled and scored on a Chuy Elguezabal triple, who then scored on a passed ball to make it 7-3.

In the top of the fifth, Donald Adams walked and scored on an Elguezabal double.

The Rockets came back to take a 12-4 lead, but the Mustangs didn't go quietly as Donald Adams, Matheny and Michael McCabe singled and Gates had a two-RBI single to make it 12-6. The rally ended there, however.

Elguezabal went two for four with a double, triple and two RBIs to lead the Mustangs at the plate.

Bellamy went two for three with a double and an RBI. Donald Adams went one for two and scored two runs.

Matheny started the hitting parade for the Mustangs in the top of the first in game two, with a solo homerun, but the Rockets countered in the bottom half with a homerun to tie it at 1-1.

In the second, Kelly Paullus singled and Brad Adams hit his first homerun to make it 3-1.

The Mustangs blew the game open in the third as Gates and Paullus singled and came home on Brad Adams' single. Bellamy then hit a two-run homerun and Donald Adams singled and went to second on a Murray sacrifice bunt. Matheny singled and McCabe hit a two-RBI double to make it 9-1.

In the fourth, Adams hit his second homerun, following a Paullus walk to make it 11-1, but the Rockets came up with a run in the bottom half.

Adams hit his third homerun in the fifth, following a Paullus single to make it 13-2. The Rockets scored a run in the bottom of the inning, but it wasn't enough as the game ended after five due to the 10-run rule.

The defensive play of the day came in the bottom of the second inning with the Mustangs up 3-1. A base hit into right field by the Rockets was going to score a run but Koby Rea came up firing to first and Gates made a good catch in the dirt to just get the runner and end the inning.

Besides Adams' big game, McCabe went two for four with two doubles and two RBIs, while Bellamy went two for three with a homerun and two RBIs. Paullus went three for three and scored four runs. Donald Adams went two for three at the plate.

The Mustangs record stands at 12-2 in the CBC and 18-5-1 overall, with one more game with Weston-McEwen before the District Tournament.

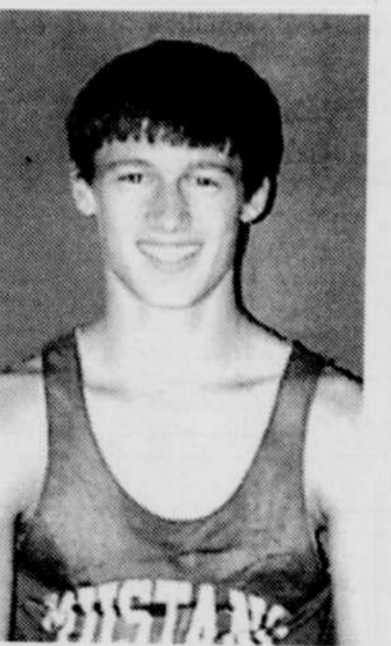

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that on June 13, 2001, the Board of Commissioners (the "Board") of the Port of Morrow, Oregon (the "Port") will hold a public hearing and regular meeting commencing at 1:30 p.m. The public hearing and regular meeting will be held in the Port of Morrow Commission Boardroom, located at Two Marine Drive, Boardman, Oregon 97818.

One of the purposes of the hearing and regular meeting is to hear public comment on a proposed plan of financing whereby Threemile Canyon Farms, LLC, a Delaware limited liability company (the "Company") has requested the Port to issue solid waste disposal revenue bonds (the "Bonds") in one or more series. The Board will consider an ordinance or resolution authorizing the proposed issuance of Bonds.

The proceeds of the Bonds will be used to finance or refinance, in whole or in part, the cost of acquiring, constructing and installing certain solid waste disposal facilities which are an integral part of the Company's three proposed dairies located on approximately 360 acres on the north and south sides of Taggares Lane, between Threemile Road on the west side, and Tower Road on the east side, in Boardman, Oregon 97818, and to pay certain related costs of issuance (the "Project"). The initial owner of the Project is the Company. The Bonds will not be general obligations of the Port, nor shall the Bonds be payable from a tax levied upon any property within the Port, but will be payable solely from payments made by the Company or a direct pay letter of credit or a credit facility to be obtained by the Company and pledged to the payment of the Bonds.

The maximum aggregate face amount of the series of Bonds proposed to be issued pursuant to such plan of financing will not exceed Twenty Million Dollars (\$20,000,000).

The public hearing will provide a reasonable opportunity for interested persons to express their views, both orally and in writing, on the proposed issuance of the Bonds and the location and nature of the facilities where the buildings and equipment to be financed will be located. Interested persons are invited to attend and testify at this hearing or submit written comments to the Port. Written comments should be delivered at the public hearing or mailed to the Port of Morrow, P.O. Box 200, Two Marine Drive, Boardman, Oregon 97818 in care of the General Manager, to be received no later than the date and time of the hearing.
