17 teachers from six Morrow County schools successfully completed the second "Teach to the Future" course sponsored by the Intel Corporation in April and May. 20 teachers completed the course last fall.

Heppner High School's technology education teacher, Dave Fowler, taught the 40-hour

course on five Fridays at Riverside High School.

The program teaches educators of all subjects and at all levels how to integrate technology into their own curriculum. As they worked through the 10 modules, teachers created a unit portfolio that included: a unit plan, student

samples, teacher support materials, and assessment tools that they can immediately use in their own classrooms.

Teachers learned to use Microsoft PowerPoint, Encarta, Word, Excel, and Publisher along with the Internet to help students learn more productively.

It was announced the Lone High School seniors all met the five benchmarks for the Certificate of Initial Mastery. All graduates will be receiving honors diplomas.

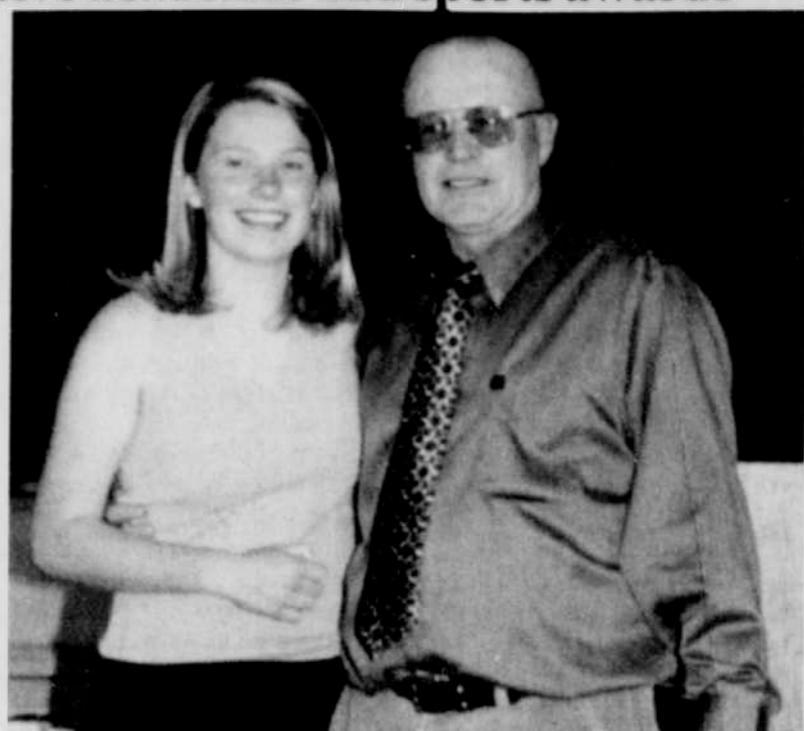

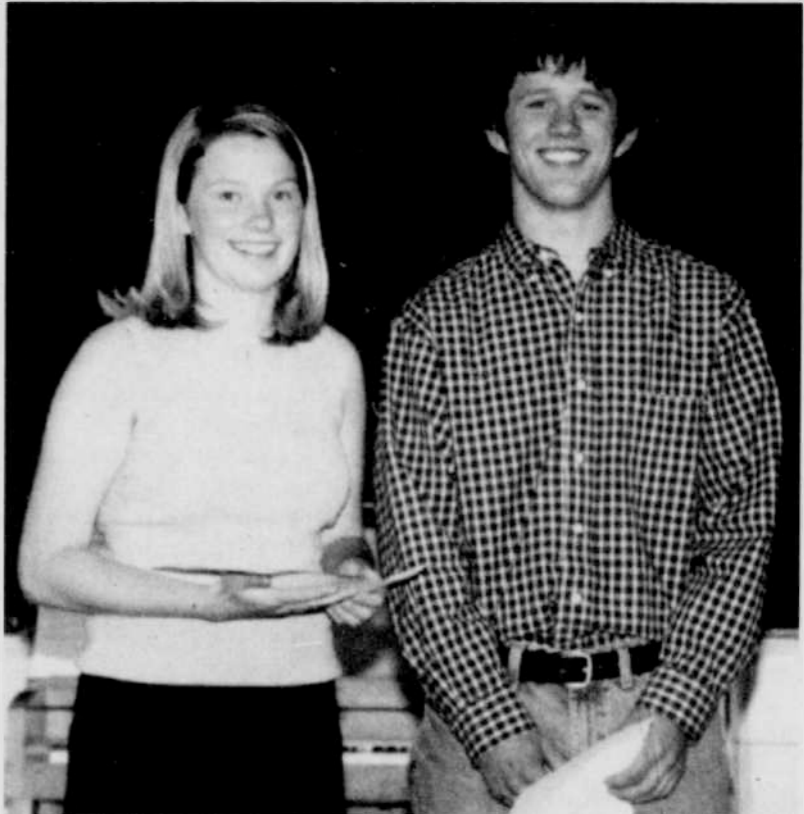
Coach Del LaRue introduced the district champion girls' track team and second place boys' track team. Both teams finished second at state, with Brad Burright breaking three state records.

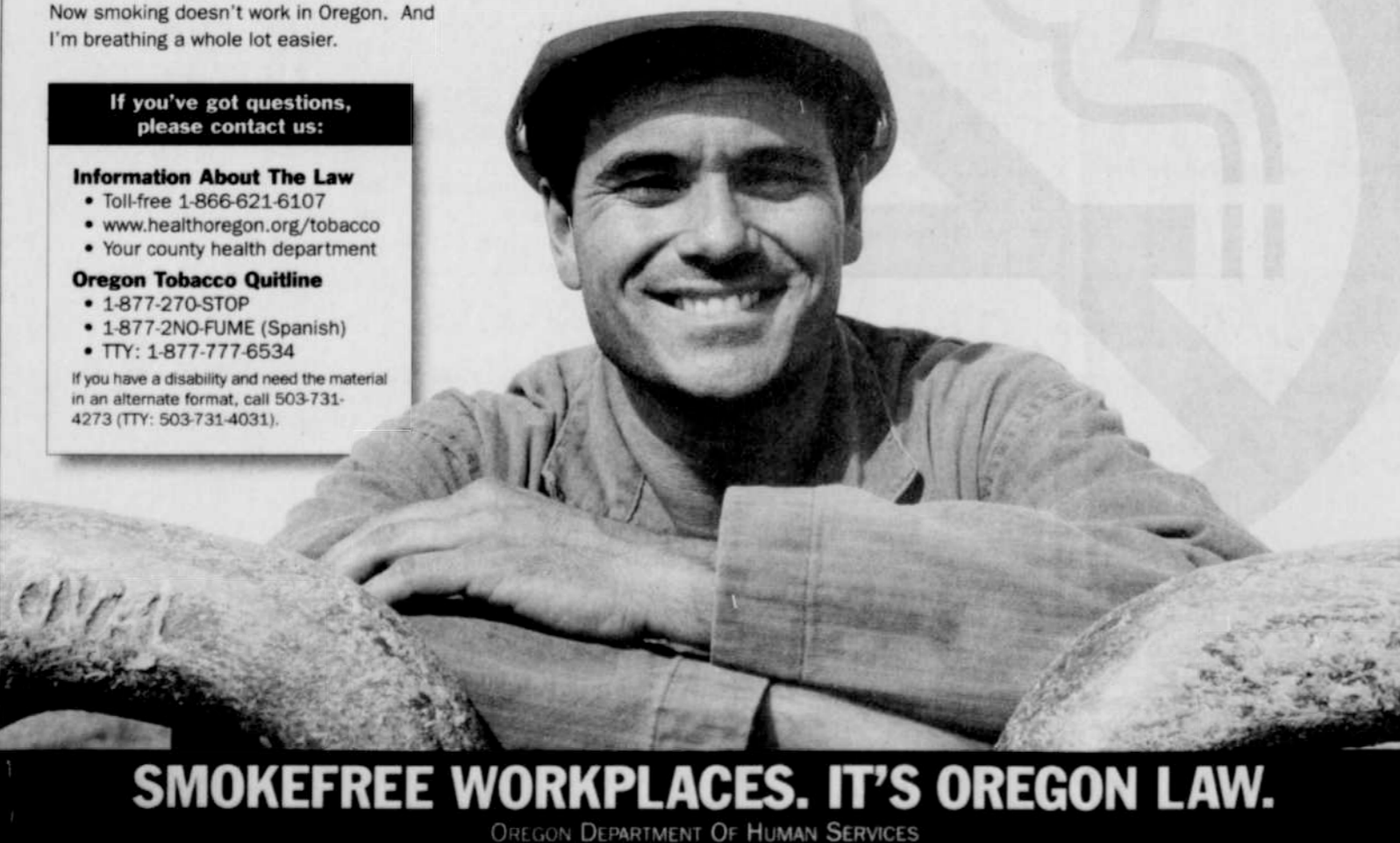
