Driggers is a graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy. He earned his master degree in operations research at Stanford University and his doctorate in operations research at U.C. Berkeley. Operations research applies mathematical modeling to real world systems to analyze and optimize their performance. Driggers worked in telecommunications, including developing network design methods at Bell Telephone Laboratories. He also specialized in systems engineering aspects of military satellites and adapting cellular phone technology to communications satellites. After retiring, Driggers moved to Orcas Island in the San Juan Islands of Washington State.

Driggers feelings Creation Evangelism, especially to young people who he feels encounter "intense evolutionary

indoctrination" in school, is highly important. One of his goals is to take complex ideas and explain them in a simple, understandable manner.

Boater education card needed by January

Boaters 30 and younger, or those who will be supervising youth 12-15, planning to operate a powerboat greater than 10 horsepower in 2003 will need their boater education card.

Kendra Callahan, program coordinator for the Oregon State Marine Board says there is an estimated 7000 people that still need to get their cards. Callahan pointed out that there is a \$75 fine for those who do not have their card.

This law also has special requirements for youth 12-15. Youth in this age group must have a boater education card to operate a motorboat of 10 hp or less alone. While, they must have their card and be supervised by a card-holding adult to operate a boat greater than 10 hp. The law also states that no one under that age of 12 may operate a motorboat in Oregon beginning in 2003.

A person must complete an approved boater education course, equivalency exam or online course to qualify for the card. "The Coast Guard Auxiliary and US Power Squadron offer some excellent courses," said Callahan. The Marine Board's web site, www.boatorregon.com, lists approved classes, equivalency exam locations and times, and links to approved online courses.

Fun after school snack to make with the kids

The Oregon Beef Council found that many kids are starting to cook for themselves or with their families and wanted to give kids ideas of recipes they can make with almost no help.

This week's recipe is: Hot Dog Smiley Face Sandwiches

Total preparation and cooking time: 15 minutes
Recipe for one sandwich, but can be increased to make as many sandwiches as needed.

Ingredients: 1 beef hot dog, vegetable cooking spray, 1 slice white or wheat bread, 1 slice American cheese, and assorted condiments and garnishes.

1.) Cut each hot dog at 1/2-inch intervals part of the way through (leave about 1/4 inch uncut). Spray small skillet with cooking spray and brown hot dog over medium heat 3 to 4 minutes on each side until golden brown and hot dog has curled and then remove from skillet.

2.) Place cheese slice on bread slice. Place in skillet. Cover and cook 1 to 2 minutes over low heat until cheese melts. Remove from skillet.

3.) Place hot dog smile on bread. Add additional condiments and garnishes to form remainder of face.

Condiment and garnish ideas: **Eyes:** sliced ripe or pimiento-stuffed olives; squirt of ketchup, mustard or barbecue sauce; or cherry tomato slices. **Nose:** cherry tomato half; or squirt of ketchup, mustard or barbecue sauce. **Ears:** small potato chips; or one-half of a small green or red bell pepper ring. **Hair:** finely shredded lettuce, carrots or cabbage; or pickle relish.

Ione started the tournament against Klickitat, losing two games, 8-25, 14-25. The second match of the day was against Wheeler, Ione narrowly squeaked past the Falcons, 25-20, 25-17. The Cardinals won their last match in pool play, 25-10, 25-14, against Alesia.

Caitlin Orem had several saves for the Cardinals. Tracy Griffith stepped up several times to hit against her opponents.

The Council was created to encourage the report of invasive species, facilitating

eradication programs, providing educational material, and promoting cooperation between state agencies and other parties concerned with harmful, non-native plants and animals.

Council members represent four state agencies; the nursery, seed, aquaculture and pet industries; environmental groups, ports, counties; and Native American tribes.

One of the first actions of the Council was developing a "100 Worst List" over the "most dangerous" invaders threatening Oregon. Some of these invaders include: Scotch broom, Himalayan blackberry, Canada thistle, starlings, nutria, European green crab and bullfrogs.
