Site Council hears AR program is up and running at Ione Schools

At the Ione Site Council meeting held March 12, members heard that the Accelerated Reader program is now running and available to students in kindergarten through eighth grades. The program is used to test the students' comprehension abilities through computer-generated questions. A complete set of K-5 library books (specifically AR), with quizzes, is also available to Ione students.

School Report Card - Our percentages of students meeting or exceeding the benchmarks looks good. Currently the different grade levels are compared with each other instead of evaluating their ability to improve from one year to the next. We understand how this can affect a school's report card as a large part of the rating is determined by improvement from one year to the next. It was suggested that the council draft a letter to Representative Greg Smith (R-Heppner) that we recommend comparing each class to itself (i.e. the class of '05 to class of '05 rather than class of '05 to class of '06, etc.). Also even though here at Ione, we are in compliance with CAM requirements, it appears that the CAM might go by the wayside. We discussed the value of CAM and several of us felt that the CAM and the accompanying portfolios are valuable to our students' education.

We also discussed the frequency of taking the benchmark tests. This year we are doing it quarterly and the reason is to be able to use the test to know where the students need improvement and more instruction. The problem is that the aggregated results did not arrive soon enough after the student took the test. It would be a very powerful tool if the results were given immediately.

We also discussed attendance policies and what could be done to encourage parents to make sure their children are in school.

Jeri McElligott reminded the council that site council members had requested a plan to set up a student/parent conference with 11-12th graders who have not passed the math CIM. State and District policy require two math credits to graduate. We would like to encourage students to continue to take math classes who are not passing the CIM.

Upcoming events announced at the meeting included: Spring Break, which is the last week in March, March 24-28; a math contest will be held April 17 and the Middle School Band Festival will be held April 23; The Oregon Writing Festival is April 25; Outdoor School will be held May 11-15; and a spelling contest is set for May 15.

Basketball for the girls: Natalie McElligott was named to the first team and Diana McElligott was named to the second team; Andrew Rietmann was named to the Shrine East team and Cayle Krebs was named as an East team alternate; Shannon Clay won the school Geography Bee and will be participating in the state geography bee on April 4; Alex Carlson received an honorable mention for his violin solo at the Washington adjudicator's competition. He was his violin teacher's youngest student to participate and get honorable mention at this event. They have to memorize and play two pieces of period music; Ashley Roberts is the state record holder for the "dead-lift" weight lifting at 510 lbs; the Ione's team participated at the Oceanography Bowl again this year at Oregon State University; and Koby Rea was named a Bowling All-Star and

Legislation in process to extend TANF waivers

Senators Gordon Smith and Ron Wyden have introduced legislation to extend Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) waivers. The bill would allow states with current TANF waivers (and those which expired last year) to renew their waivers through the next welfare reauthorization. Sixteen states would be affected by this legislation, TANF waivers allow states to operate under different rules than specified in federal law.

"By allowing Oregon case workers, rather than federal bureaucrats, to determine what individuals will need to find and keep jobs, Oregon's program has been successful at moving people off welfare and into work," said Smith. "Flexibility has been the key to this success and we need to ensure that Oregon can continue to tailor the program to the needs of each family."

WVSC scholarships available

The academic scholarship is available to a graduating, full-time senior attending a college or university (technical school in some cases) during the school year immediately following graduation. Criteria for this scholarship include scholastics, community involvement and need.
