As many parents and community members are aware, we have been working hard over the last couple of months securing grant monies and in-kind support necessary to upgrade our track facility at the high school. Our plans include the complete renovation of our existing facility to include a professionally surfaced six-lane track, event approaches, site upgrades and a spectator viewing area. Not only will this new facility grant us the opportunity to host our own track meets, it will be a worthwhile addition for community and public use.

Over a month ago we mailed out an informational flyer and donor sheet asking willing individuals and businesses to pledge in-kind support. At best, we were hoping to come up with \$50,000 worth of in-kind assistance. Much to our excitement, we have received over \$80,000 in support. 
