Oregon East Symphony to hold 4th annual music camp

Oregon East Symphony will hold its 4th annual Summer Music Camp at Blue Mountain Community College in Pendleton Monday, July 28, through Friday, Aug. 1, 2003. The camp is open to middle school through high school musicians who read music and have played or sung for at least two years. Students will participate in band, choir, or orchestra, and have a choice of interest sessions including Singing for Fun, Composition, Music for Film, Conducting, Contradance, Jazz Band, and Small Ensembles.

As in previous years, the Music Camp faculty includes outstanding professional musicians and educators from around the region. Kenneth Woods, music director/conductor of the Oregon East Symphony, will conduct the advanced orchestra and Dr. Philip Cansler returns from University of Portland to conduct the band. Dick Bauer of Salem and former Pendleton string instructor will teach the middle level string ensemble. Sandra Williams, vocal instructor from Eugene,

also returns for this year's camp. New to the camp this summer will be Trudy and Howard Otsby, who will teach contradancing, and familiar local musicians Cathy Muller, Lezlee Flagg, Cheryl Carlson, Loree McKenna and Sue Nelson will also instruct and participate in the camp. On Thursday, July 31, the camp faculty will present a recital at 7:30 p.m. at BMCC's Pioneer Theater. Last summer's recital, a fundraising event for Oregon East Symphony, was a highlight of the week.

Camp will begin at 9:00 a.m. and end at 4:00 p.m. daily. The week will conclude with a concert of all the student ensembles at 5:30 p.m. on Friday, August 1. Team Oregon to offer motorcycle safety class

Team Oregon Motorcycle Safety Program is sponsoring a basic motorcycle rider course in LaGrande, July 18-20.

This 16-hour course includes both classroom and on-cycle instruction and will be conducted over a three-day period. Enrollment is limited and pre-registration is required. Motorcycles and helmets are provided for student use during the course. Tuition is \$95.

Motorcycle riders under the age of 21 must successfully complete this course to become eligible for a motorcycle endorsement on their Oregon operator's license. DMV will waive motorcycle examinations for course graduates.
