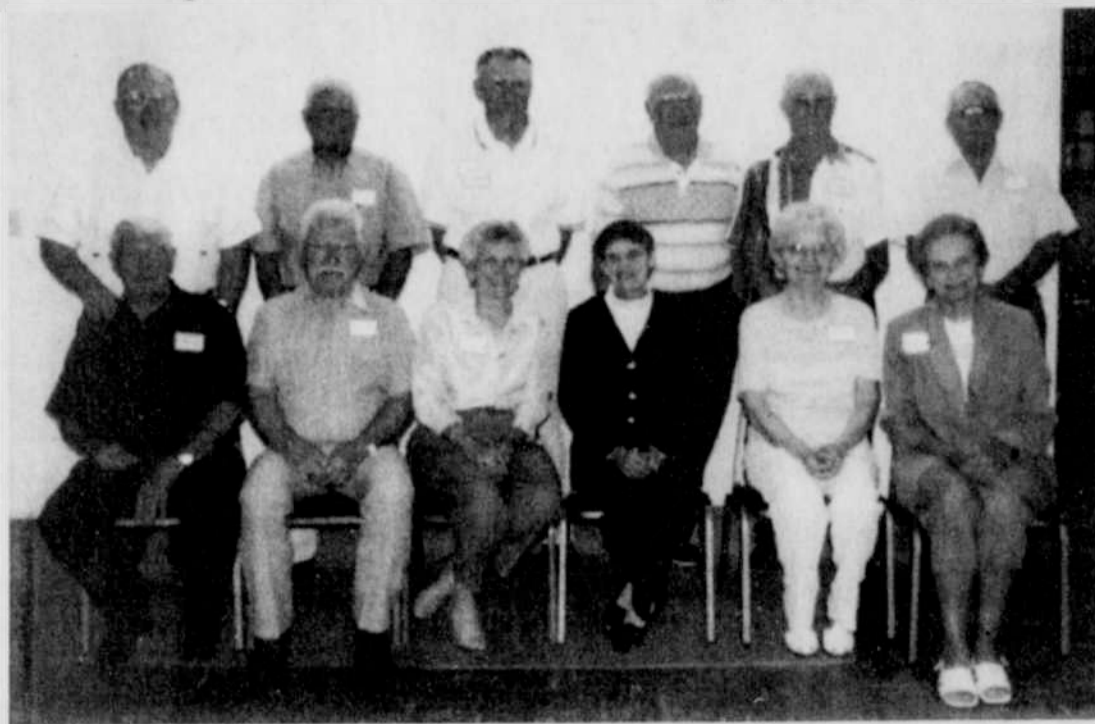


## Three-year class reunion enjoyed by all

### George Eldon Tucker

George Eldon Tucker, 75, of Ione, died Monday, July 7, 2003, at Mid-Columbia Medical Center in The Dalles. A graveside service was held July 14 at High View Cemetery in Ione.

Tucker was born Dec. 22, 1927, near Heppner, to William and Mildred Harrison Tucker. He grew up in the Heppner area and attended area schools and helped his family by logging trees.

During World War II, he served with the Army and was stationed in Germany. During the Korean War he served with the Air Force.

On June 8, 1950, he married Patricia Gladys Drake.

For more than 30 years worked for the City of Ione in many capacities including Chief of Police. He was a member of the Ione Volunteer Fire Department and a life member of the Ione American Legion, receiving a 50-year pin.

He loved spending time in the mountains, fishing, hunting deer and elk, looking for mushrooms, collecting coins, antiques and he was an avid rockhound. It was said that he was always willing to lend a hand to neighbors and friends.

Survivors include a son, David Tucker of Ione; daughters, Teresa King of Silverton, Tanya Tieg of McMinnville and Tammie Williams of Layton, Utah; sister, Mary Evelyn Ross of Colton; nine grandchildren; and two great-grandchildren.

## DA's Report

Raymond Dale Rhode was found guilty of Theft in the Second Degree, a Class-A misdemeanor. Rhode was sentenced to 40 hours community service, 24 months bench probation and payment of \$624 in fines and fees.

Chaunesty Lynn Allan admitted to violations of probation allegations for Possession of a Controlled Substance - Methamphetamine. Allan was sentenced to 19 days in jail and continuation of prior probation.

Lawrence McClen Montez admitted to violation of probation allegation for Possession of a Controlled Substance. Montez was sentenced to 10 days in jail and continuation of prior probation.

Jarvis Donald Buck admitted to violation of probation allegation for Burglary in the Second Degree. Buck was sentenced to six months in jail and 12 months probation.

Travis A. Reed pled guilty to Possession of a Controlled Substance, a Class-C felony. Reed was sentenced to 18 months formal probation, 80 hours of community service, completion of a drug package to be administered by Morrow County Behavioral Health and payment of \$664 in fines and fees.

Philbert D. Lossing was convicted of Theft-1, a Class-C felony and Assault-3, a Class-C felony. Lossing was sentenced concurrently for both counts, along with a sentence currently being served out of Klamath County. In Morrow County, he was sentenced to 18 months supervised probation, 30 days in jail and payment of \$164 in fines and fees.

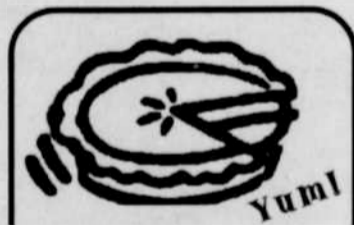
