Morrow County students learn about life and road safety

Cara Johnston, a speaker on student leadership and road safety, spoke this week at the three high schools in Morrow County.

Johnston, met Sr. Deputy Randy Rayburn at a police conference, and after hearing what she had to share, Deputy Rayburn wanted to bring her to Morrow County to share with the students and expand on the message students received last year during simulated car crashes.

Johnston, 27, from Vancouver, Canada, has spoke in over 200 high schools in five countries after losing her twin sister in a car accident just after they had graduated from high school. She has been giving presentations for the past eight years and wants to continue doing so while she is still young enough to reach high school age students.

She speaks to the students on responsible choices, on things they shouldn't do in vehicles and in life and things they can do instead. Although her message is very serious, she says that she tries to deliver it with some humor. She wants students to know that life is precious.

She said that she was one of those people who thought nothing serious would ever happen to her and that car accidents and such were only things that happened on television. "I want to remind students that it can happen to them," Johnston said. She also added that an estimated 90 people an hour die in the United States as a result of a car accident.

Morrow County along with Carlton Together Cares, in Carlton, OR, spearheaded getting Johnston into Oregon schools. Morrow County sponsors were Wheatland Insurance-Heppner and Ione, Odd Fellows, Mutual of Enumclaw and Riverfront Lodge.
