Behind the scenes, she has adopted trees, strung lights, organized parades, led after-dark walks through the cemetery and been active with the Morrow Mural Committee.

Some little known facts about Harrison include the fact that she loves to travel, but hates flying; she and her sister saved a man and his son while swimming in the Columbia River some years ago; she loves to dance; and she hated to part with her little red Mustang when her family outgrew it.

She has taken youth to Mexico and worked as an advisor to programs in which the youth worked on building homes for the people there. She has volunteered countless hours to helping feed the hungry in Portland homeless shelters and on the street with groups of Heppner youth. She also organizes her own children to help the elderly or those with illness here in Heppner when their yards need raking or snow needs shoveling.

Another added enjoyment to having Elguezal in the community is her legendary Mexican cooking. From handmade tortillas to a fabulous chicken mole, she does it all. She also is very active in donating this wonderful cooking skill to local fundraisers for a variety of causes.

Giving of her time, her talent and herself, many have said that Elguezal is the very definition of a gifted teacher.
