All participants should park in the designated area and proceed to the registration area with an unloaded rifle with the bolt open and several bullets.

There is a \$20 entry fee for each shooter who will receive one shot. Participants who want to shoot again will be allowed another shot for an additional \$20. There will be no back-to-back shots.

All money (after expenses) will go for the prizes for kids at Ione's 4th of July Celebration.

The prize for the event is \$100 for hitting and breaking the TV tube. If more than one person breaks the TV tube, then a shoot-off will commence after everyone has shot. Only one person will win the \$100 prize.

Each person will be given a shooting number and their rifle and bullets will be announced placed on a carpeted trailer by the safety officer for display. No one will handle the rifles while they are one display. If a participant chooses not to display their rifle, it should be left locked in their vehicle until they are ready to shoot.


