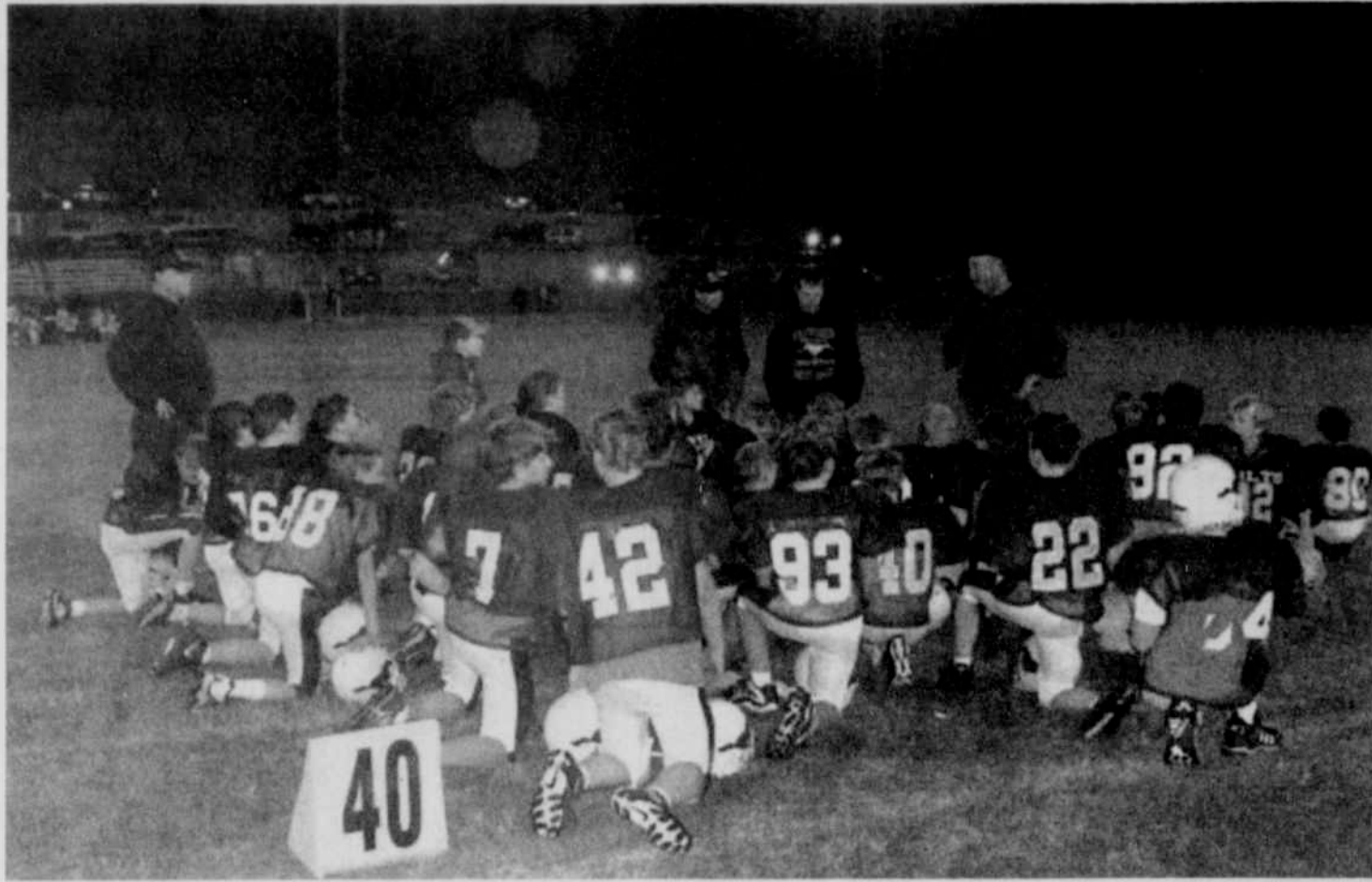


Colts win season ender

Oregon 4-H launches Hall of Fame to celebrate Centennial

The Oregon State University Extension Service 4-H Youth Development program celebrated its 100th year of service to Oregon youth by inducting 100 4-H supporters and leaders into the newly created Oregon 4-H Hall of Fame.

Lois Richards, of Irrigon, was among the 100 inducted into the Hall of Fame.

The inaugural group of 4-H Hall of Famers, dubbed the 'Centennial' 4-H over the years," said Jim class, was recognized at a

special induction ceremony held recently at OSU. Future members of the Oregon 4-H Hall of Fame will be inducted annually.

"In honor of the past century of hard work building and maintaining one of the finest state 4-H youth programs in the country, we established the Oregon 4-H Hall of Fame to acknowledge those individuals who've made significant contributions to 4-H over the years," said Jim Rutledge, OSU 4-H Youth

Development program leader.

The 100 inductees selected through a nomination process include 4-H volunteer leaders from throughout the state, campus-based OSU 4-H youth development specialists, county-based 4-H field faculty, and 4-H donors who have provided financial support.

"These 'Centennial' inductees all share in common great dedication and excellence in service to 4-H," said Rutledge. "For example, we have people in this group who have spent 50 years or more working as volunteer leaders in county 4-H programs."

The Oregon 4-H Youth program began in Yamhill County in 1904 when school superintendent, L.R. Alderman, organized a boys' 4-H industrial club in Dayton.

Since then, a long line of committed 4-H volunteers, supporters and OSU 4-H Youth program faculty have continually worked to provide quality 4-H youth education programs aimed at helping Oregon's young people develop life and leadership skills, Rutledge said.

He added that the Oregon 4-H Youth program has had a noteworthy track record of success in developing new and innovative 4-H programs.

"The Oregon 4-H Program is recognized as a national leader in reaching

out to Latino youth through programs like the 4-H Tech Wizards club that emphasizes computer and Web development skills," said Rutledge. "Oregon 4-H youth faculty are also pioneering new ways to evaluate the effectiveness of 4-H educational programs."

"The strength of the Oregon 4-H youth program has been, and continues to be, the devotion of our community volunteers and the quality of our OSU 4-H faculty who manage the program," said Rutledge. "Our challenges in the future will be to expand the outreach of 4-H to more Oregon youth and to create new educational programs that will appeal to the contemporary interests of today's young people."

McElligott receives National Founders of Adolescent Health award

Dr. Kathleen McElligott, a 1973 graduate of Ione High School, was awarded the National Founders of Adolescent Health Award for Community Leadership at the annual conference of the academy held in San Francisco on Oct. 10.

The award is presented to an individual who has done much in their community to improve the care of teenagers and to inform pediatricians about the needs of adolescents and the health care they require. Individuals may have established facilities for teens in their community, provided direct care to adolescents or have guided and taught medical students, residents and pediatricians. The recipient of the award must be well known to the pediatricians in their community as the resource for adolescent health care.

Dr. McElligott is the director of the Teen Mother and Child Program at the Health Science Center at the University of Utah. She received the award for her remarkable dedication to her

patients. She is committed to educating residents on how to care for, understand and serve the adolescent population. In addition to her role as director of the program, she has been the primary resource for adolescent medicine in the state of Utah. As the recipient of the award, Dr. McElligott received a \$500 honorarium, a plaque and specified travel expenses to the national conference for the award presentation.

Dr. McElligott, the daughter of Donald and Eunice McElligott, was raised on the family ranch south of Ione. After graduating from Ione High School, she studied pre-med at the University of Portland and graduated from the University of Oregon Medical School in 1981. After a year's residency in family practice in Spokane, she finished her residency at the University of Utah Hospital at Salt Lake in pediatrics, where she maintains her practice today. She is married to Dr. Alfred Cheung, a prominent research fellow in urology at the university. They have one teenage daughter, Anne, who looks forward to her summer vacations at the ranch in Morrow County.

Epsilon Sigma Phi recognizes exemplary extension work

The Oregon chapter of Epsilon Sigma Phi, a national honorary fraternity of Extension Service professional educators, recognized several members recently for their accomplishments.

All Extension educators working in county Extension Service offices throughout the state are OSU faculty members whose primary function is to extend university research-based educational information to the public, said Nancy Kershaw, field faculty in the Tillamook County office of the OSU Extension Service and ESP program coordinator.

Locally recognized was Patricia Dawson. Dawson, 4-H youth development field faculty in Umatilla County, received the ESP Mid-Career Service award for Extension educators with 10-20 years of service. Dawson, known nationally for research on adult volunteer learning styles and training preferences, helped develop a nationally recognized leadership program for Hispanic students in Umatilla and Morrow counties.

Justice Court report

The Morrow County Justice Court for Heppner and Irrigon for the month of September handled 185 cases resulting in \$33,857.57.

There were also 19 pre-trials, 90 warrants issued, five suspensions ordered, five DUI Diversion filed, 20 warrants returned from the Sheriff's Office and 60 accounts sent to a collection agency.

Twelve hearings were held consisting of seven minor hearings (traffic), two jury trials, two small claims, sentencing, etc., and one other hearing.

Of the monies received all was turned over with \$8800.87 going to the state, \$24,591.25 going to the county and \$465.45 paid out in restitution.
