

Lady Cards win at Nixyaawii

The Ione girls' varsity saw their Big Sky winning streak flashing before their eyes last Tuesday, Feb. 1 at Nixyaawii, trailing 34-32 entering the fourth quarter, but thanks to an offensive spurt and several key players fouling out for Nixyaawii, they managed to keep the streak alive, winning the game 44-38.

The game was tight the entire way. The Lady Cards trailed at the end of one 15-9 and held a slim 23-22 lead at the half. It was still within two after three, but Ione took advantage of their hosts' foul trouble to pick up the offensive pace, outscoring the Golden Eagles 12-4 in the last quarter. Nixyaawii finished the game with just four players on the floor.

Lady Cards end winning streak

The Ione Lady Cards split their games over the weekend, winning a tough contest against Arlington at home on Friday, Feb. 4 and losing to a strong Dufur squad on the road on Saturday, Feb. 5. The loss brought the winning streak that started in early January to an end but the Cardinals still have an enviable Big Sky record of 11-1. Their season mark stands at 12-7.

Arlington kept the game within striking distance for the first three quarters, trailing just 6-9 after one, 19-11 at the half and 27-19 after three. But the Lady Cards came up big in the fourth quarter, reeling off 21 points to the Honker's 10 to pull away for the final 48-29 win.

Sara Peck led the Cardinals with 16 points and 14 rebounds. Amber Patton had 15 points and 15 rebounds. Also scoring for the Lady Cardinals were Kylee Svetich with seven, Jenny Griffith and Ashly Grams each with four and Kayla LaRue with two.

Coach Ryan Rudolf commended the fine defensive play of Griffith, Grams and Emily Rietmann.

"We did a great job of using our height advantage against Arlington," said Coach Rudolf. "They hustled a lot and kept the game close until the fourth quarter. We played good team defense and really got our offense going in the final quarter to put the game out of reach."

On Saturday at Dufur, the Lady Cards struggled against the fifth-ranked team in the state.

Amber Patton had an outstanding effort, scoring 25 points and pulling down 11 rebounds. Sara Peck was dominant on the boards, tallying 19 rebounds. She also scored four points. Also scoring for the Cards were Emily Rietmann with five points, Jenny Griffith and Kylee Svetich with three points each and Kaylee Palmateer and Ashly Grams with two each.

"This game was a lot closer than I would have liked," said Coach Ryan Rudolf. We trailed most of the game but the girls didn't give up and we were finally able to pull ahead in the fourth quarter. Nixyaawii has improved a lot since the first time we played them. I give them a lot of credit for playing us tough."

Dufur held the Cards scoreless in the second period to hold a commanding 34-6 lead at halftime. Things improved only slightly in the second half as the Rangers coasted to a 62-25 win.

Grams scored 14 points to lead the Cards. Patton was held to just three points. Rietmann scored four and Peck and Svetich each had two.

"We just didn't come ready to play," said Coach Rudolf. "If you want to be able to compete with Dufur, you have to play your best game and this obviously wasn't our best game. Ashly played a good game offensively but we needed more than one girl in double figures. I think this loss might help us refocus and get ready for the District Tournament."

Cardinals defeat Golden Eagles

A sluggish second quarter kept Nixyaawii in the game early but the Ione Cardinals finished strong to defeat the Golden Eagles 63-46 in a game played in Mission on Tuesday, Feb. 1.

The Cards had a high scoring first quarter, putting up 26 points to their opponents 16. WHAT GOES WITH THIS HOUSE?

Real estate is usually defined as the land and everything attached to it, such as: buildings, trees, shrubs, fences, etc. The buyer normally gets all of the real estate, but none of the owner's personal property. The problem arises when personal property has become a part of the real estate. This is called a fixture and does pass with the real estate.

There are three usual tests which must be satisfied. Has the personal property been permanently annexed to the real estate? Is it intended to become part of the real estate? Finally, what is the local custom? Usual fixtures might include: shades, heaters, ranges, screens, storm windows, lighting fixtures, etc.

It is important that the seller spell out specifically in the sales agreement exactly what he intends to give to the buyer as part of real estate. This will save misunderstanding at the closing, and sometimes save a sale.
