**Second annual  
Columbia Track  
Camp set  
July 7-8**

The second annual Columbia River Track Camp will be held Friday and Saturday, July 7-8 at Riverside High School in Boardman.

The Friday camp will be for students in grades five-eight; the Saturday camp is for grades nine-12. The camp will focus on stations for specific events with lots of individual attention, conditioning techniques, fluids and nutrition, according to a news release. A major focus of the camp will be on conditioning-when and how to start, when to peak and how not to over train. The camp will begin at 8 a.m. and conclude between 4 and 4:30 p.m. depending on weather, and if the participants want to do a track meet.

The clinicians for the camp are former Riverside High athlete Keith Baker, who now runs track and decathlon for the University of Alabama; Cody Fleming, who runs decathlon for University of Oregon; Megan Quinn, heptathlete for Lane Community College and Portland State University; and McKenzie Winkle, champion heptathlete for Lane Community and Portland State University. A very special guest will be Santiago Lorenzo, former NCAA champion decathlete for the University of Oregon, and was 10th in the 2004 Olympics in Athens, Greece. He has been training with Fleming at U of O this spring. "It is a special treat to have him here for our camp," said organizer Glaya Baker. "The goal of the camp is to have lots of fun, but learn something new and better techniques for improvement. We also want to show kids where track can take them with their education, and further."

The cost of the camp is \$50, which includes drinks, lunch and t-shirts. Baker advises to "hurry and register" as there are a few scholarships available.

For more information contact Baker at 541-481-7488/541-571-7938. Baker says they are encouraging pre-registration to ensure they have enough t-shirts. Coaches are welcome to come, participate, and ask questions, she says.

**Leftover  
controlled hunt  
tags go on sale  
July 1**

Hunters still seeking a controlled hunt tag can purchase from 933 leftover deer and elk tags on Saturday, July 1, at 10 a.m. PDT.

The tags, which tend to sell out in minutes, are sold on a first-come, first-serve basis at more than 500 licensed retailers statewide. ODFW offices will not be open to sell tags on July 1 this year because the date falls on a weekend. The tags will be sold at regular prices for resident and nonresident hunters.

Controlled hunts are those where state wildlife officials have limited the number of hunters to improve game management and enhance the hunting experience. Hunting season dates and bag limits still apply.

On June 20, ODFW made available the results of a random computer drawing for 134,746 controlled hunt tags. The 933 leftover tags represent instances where available tags outnumbered applicants.

**Historic Boardman  
relocation documentary to  
premier**

"Community School In Flames!" "Columbia River Covers Main Street!" "Heartbreaking Appeal To U.S Supreme Court.", and "Boeing to Test Space Rockets in Boardman".

Everyone is invited to experience the history surrounding these headlines in a documentary on the Boardman relocation project entitled, The "Higher Ground." The historic relocation documentary will premier at 7 p.m. on July 11 at the Boardman Senior Center in Boardman. The documentary captures the story of displacement and relocation of the old Boardman town to higher ground in the mid 1960's.

"Higher Ground" was produced by IBEX Communications of Portland. In the fall of 2005, the film crew visited Boardman, interviewing citizens who experienced the move first-hand. Ibex also filmed selected sites in present Boardman, for comparison with historic 8 mm amateur movies taken during the relocation. Amateur movies, historic photos and documents loaned by community

members were preserved and restored to remove graininess, and enhance faded colors. Restored historic materials were then combined with local interviews, news clippings and film footage from archives of the Army Corps of Engineers.

The documentary project was organized and administered by North Morrow Community Foundation Board of Directors. They say they believe this project preserves some of the history of Boardman in an interesting and informative manner. The foundation received funding from: Morrow County Cultural Coalition, City of Boardman, Morrow County Court and Morrow County Historical Society. Port of Morrow and Ibex Corporation provided in-kind support. DVD copies of the documentary will be available for purchase at the premier. The price has yet to be determined.

The Boardman Senior Center is located at 100 Tatone Street (near the intersection of South Main Street and City Center Boulevard).

**Heppner Beautification Commission  
discusses projects**

The Heppner Beautification/Parks & Lands Commission meeting was held at Heppner City Hall on June 8.

According to a commission news release, work at the "old pool site" is proceeding. They reported that there are a lot of weeds at the site which have grown up during the recent rainy weather and they will be dealt with as the site is graded and beams formed. Due to the rain, the crew has not been able to do some of this work at the site but it is drying out again and work should be restarted soon. Enclosing the section in the back of the site to prevent entry under the deck is planned, using portions of the old fence to block the opening but this part of the project will be delayed because the sidewalk project elsewhere in the city takes precedence over any other projects at this time, they said.

They reported that work is being done at Hager Park, time permitting. The plan is to have grass seeded by the end of the summer with watering until then to keep the dust down. There is an area that is rocky and not fit for grass, but a committee that was formed

to work on this will wait until fall to work on a plan. The site should be kept clean and an October/November time frame is on the calendar to consider different options.

According to the commission report, the hanging baskets have already received many favorable comments this year both from residents and from out-of-town visitors. An idea for watering the baskets in the future, which involves installing a drip system to the baskets is being considered, possibly trying the idea on one pole to see if this would be feasible, although funds are a consideration. Having a volunteer water the baskets this summer is working out satisfactorily so far, they said.

A new net has been installed on the tennis courts and the other net is being repaired. Joanne Burleson is working on bids for resurfacing and redirecting lighting. The tennis courts are a good community benefit and grants could be available for some of the work, the report indicated.

The public is welcome to attend commission meetings which are held on the second Thursday of each month.

**Music in the Parks to feature  
barbershop quartet**

Music in the Parks will be held on Monday, July 3, beginning at 7 p.m. at the Boardman Marina Park. The Duct Tape Men's Barbershop Quartet from the Tri Cities will present melodies of Broadway, jazz, doo-wop and gentle rock to "create a classic mix that will set your toes tapping and make you want to sing along," according to a news release. Duct Tape has been entertaining Tri-Cities crowds for three years. They also sing with the Columbia River Chordsmen Chorus Barbershop music, an original American folk style that traces back to 1900 era balladeers-three men who harmonized around a fourth who sang a catchy melody. Later, the urbane melodies of Broadway and jazz were added, then doo-wop and gentle rock. "The result is a classic mix that can set your toes tappin', twang a heart string, and make you want to sing along." Paul LaCombe, Jim Cowin, Bill Grams, and Denny Meier create this a cappella close harmony.
