Kelsey Wolff: sixth place 200m, 34.32; and third place 400m, 1:19.23.

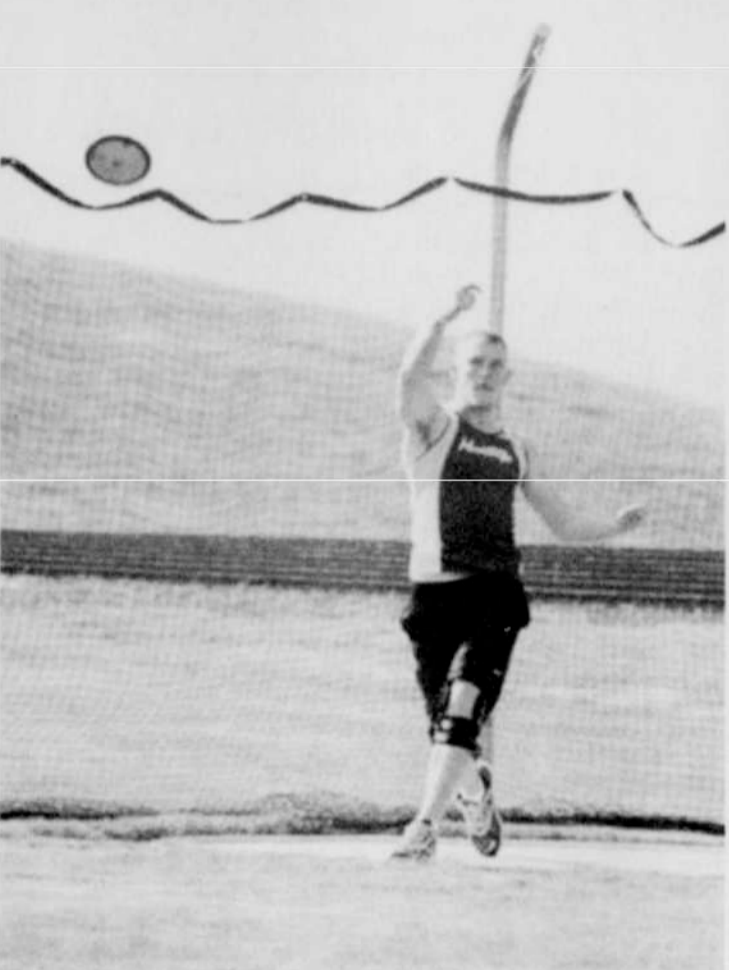

Watershed Field Days celebrates 10 years

The Morrow Soil and Water Conservation District was part of the conception of the Watershed Field Days program in 1997. This year the WFD will be celebrating 10 years. The local Willow Creek site is scheduled on Wednesday, May 2, from 9 a.m. until 2:30 p.m. at Duane Neiffer's property west of Lexington.

The presenters will be served barbequed hamburgers this year to celebrate the 10 year anniversary. Some of the presenters have been donating their time for the field day every year.

The McKay Creek field day is located south east of Pendleton and is scheduled on Monday, April 30 and Tuesday, May 1, the Umatilla River Site is located west of Hermiston and scheduled on Thursday and Friday, May 3-4.

For the past nine years, the Watershed Field Days have created an invaluable learning experience with in-the-field, hands-on learning about our most valuable resource - water. More than 4000 elementary, middle school and high school students have participated in the Field Days over the years.

The Watershed Field Day exposes students to the concept of "Watershed." Within the Watershed concept, the learning stations focus on two themes: Agricultural Practices That Benefit the Environment, and Healthy Streams: Evaluation and Restoration Skills.

Each day the students will rotate among seven different learning stations that include: Soil Development and Formation; Weather and Watersheds; Wheat Plant Identification and Plant Experimentation Procedures; Mapping - GPS and compass work; Macro-invertebrate Sampling and Identification; Water Quality Monitoring and Testing; and Stream Bank Stabilization and Restoration.

Presenters from area natural resource agencies and school educators will teach the Field Day Stations. Agencies participating in the Field Days include: National Weather Service - NOAA; Umatilla Basin Watershed Council; Oregon Department of Agriculture; USDA-Agriculture Research Station; Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife; The Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation; Umatilla Soil and Water

Conservation District; Morrow Soil and Water Conservation District; OSU-Columbia Basin Research Station; Natural Resource Conservation Service; and Umatilla National Forest and Gilliam Soil and Water Conservation District.

In addition, Field Day organizers have invited teachers to bring high school leadership classes and science students to the field day as station presenters and leaders. About 70 high school students from Pilot Rock High, Pendleton High, Heppner High, Ione High, Irrigon High and Hermiston High schools will participate.

Stations are designed to provide students with hands-on contextual learning activities that focus on a few of the many components that make up the study of Watershed systems. Teachers will use water conservation kits purchased by the Consortium to make water conservation a part of each student's future by applying what was learned at the field day into daily living.
