Oral histories of the NW Chautauqua program planned at Heppner Library

A free Oregon Chautauqua program is planned for Sat., July 21, at 7 p.m. at the Heppner Public Library, 444 Main St. All area residents and their friends and families are welcome to attend.

The special presentation by Tom Nash, entitled "True Stories and Other Fictions in Northwest Oral History," is sponsored by the Oregon Trail Library District and Libraries of Eastern Oregon in collaboration with The Oregon Council for the Humanities.

Where does history end and folklore begin? Tom Nash looks at the elements of folklore embedded in supposedly nonfiction stories of frontier Oregon and the West. His engaging program explores the threads of legend and tall tales drawn from Oregon oral histories, and the interplay between memory and actual events.

Tales". "This Chautauqua program has had rave reviews. We're pleased to bring it to Morrow County," said Marsha Richmond of Heppner, who serves as OTLD director.
