

## Sheriff's Report

The Morrow County Sheriff's Office reports handling the following business:

**September 5:** -MCSO received a report that the neighbors mastiff dog keep king their dog through their fence. They talked to the neighbors and they refuse to do anything about the dogs- dog was attacked on Thursday and put down yesterday. Caller reports that the dogs have also tied to attack the caller's husband.

Morrow County District Attorney Elizabeth Ballard has released the following report:

-Joel Lomas Murillo, 24, was convicted of Menacing, a Class A misdemeanor, and was sentenced to 180 days incarceration with 180 days suspended, 12 months bench probation, other conditions, and pay \$1,843 in fines, fees, and assessments.

-Enrique Pacheco, 39, was convicted of Harassment, a Class B misdemeanor, and was sentenced to 90 days incarceration with 90 days suspended, 12 months bench probation, complete 20 hours of community service, other conditions, and pay \$463 in fines, fees, and assessments.

-Joseph Lee Swope, 28, was convicted of Failure to Register as a Felony Sex Offender, a Class C felony, and was sentenced to 90 days incarceration with 60 days suspended, 18 months bench probation, other conditions, and pay \$608 in fines, fees, and assessments.
