"They didn't finish quite as well at districts last weekend as they would have liked, so we worked all week on restoring confidence and being mentally prepared. They could easily have retreated after drawing the first seed and made excuses when they lost the first round. Instead, they both came battling back like champions. If Chance would have started the tournament as strong as he finished, I have no doubt he could have won it all. He certainly could have stood on the podium with any size class with the way he wrestled that last match. And Wacy had some of the best wrestling talent from Oregon in his bracket and he came out a medal winner. It was a career day for both of them and a historic day for Heppner wrestling. I'm extremely proud of these two and the bar they've set for the young wrestlers to follow."

**Local author to host program at city hall**

The world is full of people that believe they live in God's country. Oregon author Stuart Dick has written a history of Old Oregon that documents the hand of God in the discovery, settlement and ultimate destiny of the Pacific Northwest.

His book "Old Oregon, Under the Shadow of the Almighty" illustrates the triumph of the American spirit, in particular the undaunted courage and faith of the pioneer men and women that risked their lives to establish American institutions that ultimately tipped the scales in favor of the emerging republic in the epic battle for west.

"In the beginning this book was about the Matteson School House, the last remnant of the pioneer forefather's heritage in Morrow County. For historic perspective Dick determined to include an introductory chapter on the origins of the American West. When he began to document the written accounts of the first mariners, fur traders, mountain men and missionaries a largely unwritten and undocu-

mented epic drama for control of ancient Oregon began to emerge. For nearly three hundred years, seventeen nations and three hundred ships searched relentlessly for the gateway to the West, the Northwest Passage now known as the Columbia River. How could the mighty Columbia River, one of the greatest rivers in the world and the greatest river flowing into the Pacific Ocean, remain undiscovered for nearly three hundred years? Did the hand of God intervene?"

Dick's history of Old Oregon documents that even though American mariner Robert Grey discovered the Columbia River in 1792, and Lewis and Clark explored the Pacific North West at the turn of the 19th century, the British Hudson Bay Company, not America, owned and controlled the Pacific Northwest by 1820. The historical record reveals no American enterprise, initiative or national movement existed at that hour to include Old Oregon in the union of American states. Old Oregon docu-

ments the epic drama of how America emerged victorious in the mysteriously untold dramatic contest for the Pacific North West.

Stuart Dick and his wife Julie will be in Heppner for the St. Patrick's Day Celebration Saturday, March 13, to present a power point program at Heppner City Hall at 3:30 p.m. to illustrate the story of how America won the west. In addition, Dick will share the story of the impact of the Irish Catholic's in Heppner's heritage as well as the testimony of Heppner pioneers including Bill Lowe, Lois Winchester, and L.E. Dick Jr. to whom the book is dedicated. Although the Matteson School House only comprises one chapter of Old Oregon, and nearly every evidence of this mountain heritage has been erased save the school house, nevertheless the courageous testimony of the first pioneers of any race to live year round in the Blue Mountains remains as a monument of pioneer courage and the undaunted faith of our forefathers.
