cardiology clinics in Heppner, is currently working part-time for OHSU. Blauer said, however, that OHSU officials communicated that possible cardiology clinics would most likely be through their clinic in The Dalles, and may not necessarily involve Dr. Hanlon.

-learned from Blauer that around 60 people turned out for the Rolling Hills Run fund raiser April 23.

-discussed a proposed Irrigon Clinic upgrade and learned that board member David Burns visited the clinic and inquired as to what the clinic's employees want if the clinic is remodeled.

"We have money budgeted," said Board Chair Larry Mills. "We want to have the community of Irrigon engaged. We'd like to come as close as possible to what the community would like to see."

Blauer voiced concern of the Irrigon Clinic being busy enough to support a clinic remodel. Mahoney cautioned that if USDA funding for the remodel is sought, USDA may want to see detail that shows community support of the clinic, especially since the new Boardman Clinic construction is expected to be completed in a year. The cities of Boardman and Irrigon are around 10 miles apart.

-learned that the group, "Friends Helping Friends," donated \$3,300 toward purchase of a Glidescope, which will facilitate intubation, which is the placement of flexible tubing in the windpipe to maintain an open airway. Molly Rhea, director of nursing services at Pioneer Memorial Hospital, said that the procedure is sometimes difficult for even seasoned medical personnel, but the Glidescope will make it easier. The donation resulted from proceeds from a fund-raising run/walk over St. Patrick's weekend in Heppner.

-heard that the Irrigon ambulance is currently on the rotation to be replaced by a new model. The old Irrigon ambulance will become Heppner's backup vehicle; Heppner's vehicle will go to lone; and Lone's will go to surplus.

-agreed to purchase a \$100 brick for Columbia River Community Health Services' clinic construction.

-learned from Rhea that the long term care program at Pioneer Memorial Hospital has reached its max and now has eight residents, which leaves only four beds for the hospital. Blauer and the board voiced appreciation to Rhea for her efforts in increasing the occupancy.

-learned that Rhea has also been active in outreach to the Morrow County school children on the use of helmets and seat belts to reduce traumatic injuries.

-received the following report for March: Pioneer Memorial Hospital had 10 admissions, two swing bed admissions, 16 admitted for observation, four admitted to the swing nursing facility, 557 total outpatients, 74 total emergency encounters, 2113 lab tests, 132 x-ray procedures, 30 CT scans, 32 EKG tests, two colonoscopy procedures, 43 respiratory therapy and three colon/endoscopy procedures; Pioneer Memorial Clinic had 542 patient visits with 44 new patients, 63 seen by a nurse and eight no shows; Irrigon had 206 patient visits with 35 new patients, 42 seen by a nurse and 10 no shows; Home Health had 117 patient visits; Hospice had two admissions; Pharmacy had 1254 drug doses for \$73,421 in drug revenue; Heppner Ambulance had 18 total page-outs with 14 transports for \$19,872 in revenue; Boardman Ambulance had 21 page-outs with 11 transports for \$12,133 in revenue; Irrigon Ambulance had 19 page-outs with 15 transports for \$15,039 in revenue; there were three flights.

**Boardman approves zone change for new medical clinic**

The Boardman city council adopted an ordinance approving a zone change to accommodate the construction of Columbia River Community Health Services new clinic. The property the new clinic will be located on was dual-zoned, a portion in Multi-Family Sub-District and a portion in the Commercial District along Willowfork Drive. It was the recommendation of the Boardman Planning Commission to change 1.08 acres to commercial, which amends the City of Boardman Zoning and Comprehensive Plan Maps. There will be a 21-day appeal period on this decision.

In other city business, the council heard an annual update on tourism from the Boardman Chamber of Commerce, they approved an increase in the city's contract with the Boardman Park & Recreation District for maintenance of the city's park areas, and they approved an easement to Umatilla Electric to run overhead power lines near the city wastewater treatment facility.

The next meeting of the Boardman city council will be Tuesday, May 3 at Boardman City Hall; the meeting will begin at 7 p.m.
