-Continued from PAGE ONE applications for the job. A special city council meeting will be held on Monday, June 18, at 6 p.m. at Heppner City Hall to continue the process of finding a replacement. The meeting is open to the public.

-heard that there will be a meeting on Tuesday, June 26, from 6 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. at city hall with the engineers of the Sperry Street relocation project, explaining the job and answering citizen's questions. The public is invited to attend.

-decided to declare two city lots on Riverside as surplus and sell the lots to the public.

Last month the council was approached about selling the lots to David and Terri Denton. The Dentons said the lots have weeds and trash on them and, if they bought them, they would clean them up and maintain the property. One of the lots had been used for the community garden, but that was moved up by the high school because of the weed problem. The Dentons did not offer a price, but the council told DeMayo to do some research and come up with a proposed asking price. The lot was apparently donated to the city in 1997.

Monday, DeMayo reported that he talked with county assessor Greg Sweek, who said there was not much value on the property and that \$500 "isn't a bad offer" for the land. DeMayo said the lots had no comparable properties sold in the area, were in the flood plain, so had building restrictions, and that the city has been putting maintenance into the property with no return.

"Let's put it on the tax roll and get a return of some amount," DeMayo recommended.
