Pipes to swirl at Condon when Scots toast Robert Burns, heritage

Planning is in progress
for the 16th annual Robert
Burns Day celebration
in Condon. The event is
scheduled for Saturday,
Jan. 26, and will take place
at the Condon Elks Lodge
on Main Street beginning
at 2 p.m.
Pipers, drummers,
dancers and vocalists will
come from Pendleton, Ar-
lington, Redmond, Bend,
Portland, McMinnville and
Carson, WA to help the
Condon community cele-
brate its Scottish heritage
on the 254th anniversary
of the birth of Scotland's
beloved Bard Robert Burns.
The celebration is in its 16th
year as an organized event,
and has become a favorite
wintertime diversion at
Condon.
The event features
lively music from the "Old
Country," a traditional Scot-
tish meal of "haggis, neeps
and tatties," and anecdotes
from the annals of Scottish
families who settled in the
greater Gilliam County area
in the mid-to-late 1800s.
Area families of Scottish
heritage are encouraged to
search through their family

Judith Faye 'Pachy' Burns

Strength personified
in her swagger, her perfect
cowboy hat, scarf and vest,
she was always ready for
adventure, this was the
Pachy we all knew and
loved. She died suddenly
and too soon on January
6, 2013 in a car accident
near her ranch in Oregon.
Pachy liked to say "she
lived to dance and danced
to live." She did not sleep
much; she worked hard
and enjoyed life to the
fullest extent possible. She
got at least 90 years of
living out of her 63 years.
A memorial service will
be held at the Lutheran
Church in Big Timber on
Friday, January 11, at 3 p.m.
Tim Shirley will preside.
A memorial service in Oregon
will be announced later this
spring.
Pachy was born Novem-
ber 1, 1949 in Poughkeepsie,
NY. Her spirit of adventure
began early in life as she
grew up and experienced
many regions of the United
States as a child and young
adult. She attended Western
State University in Gunnison,
CO and eventually claimed
her ranch in Lone as home,
although her heart was
always in Montana, where
she had raised her daughters
on a sheep ranch near
Edgar.
Her long list of accomplish-
ments and affiliations
include:
Co-Founder of the Academy
of the Rockies, Bonners
Ferry, ID; first female
Ski-Patrol at Schweitzer
Mountain, ID;

actively involved with the
Montana Wool Growers
since 1984 and the Montana
Agri-Women (Vice
President 2005); current
chairman and national
representative of the
Montana Farm Bureau
Sheep Committee; traveled
to remote areas of
Russia representing the
American Agriculture
Industry for CFNA (Citizens
Network for Foreign Af-
fairs); member of the
Montana Management as
early as 1986 by grazing
sheep on leafy spurge;
member Montana Noxious
Weed Advisory Council
and the Advisory Com-
mittee for the Skeen
Institute for Rangeland
Restoration; conducted
Jam to Lamb since 1994
and in October 2005
traveled to Japan with
Farm Bureau delegation;
Statewide Noxious
Weed Awareness Cam-
paign Advisory Commit-
tee member; involved
with the programs developed
for integrated weed control
concerning BSE issues
to regain Japanese trust
in U.S. meat industries;
and most recently, president
of Mountain Plains and
Chairperson for the Wolf
Advisory Board.
An excerpt from a letter
from a lifelong friend:
"Pachy lived large,
worked hard, defied bound-
aries, and loved beyond
description. What a great
friend she was to me and
mine. I admire her while
being in awe of all she has
accomplished. Pachy was
extra especially loyal, unique
in vision, unmatched in her

work ethic...She was tough
and unrelenting as she
built her ranching empire(s).
The love for her two daughters
was always the underlying
motivation. Ultimately her
love and motivation grew
to include Rasch and all
of Oma's grandchildren.
I've never known a livelier
more fun grandmother.
She went out like a stick
of dynamite—boldly,
being productive—just
the way she lived. She was
truly one of a kind. They
threw away the cookie
cutter when she was
created."
She is survived by:
her husband of 20 years,
Horatio "Rasch" Burns;
her daughters, Piney
(Jenn), Bluesette (Mark);
brothers, Gregory and
Randolf Craft; stepchildren,
Cameron (Alison), Lindsey
(Remi), Seth (Nancy);
step-grandchildren,
Mackenzie, Henry, Andrew,
Solange, Blaze, Calumina
and Amelia; as well as her
grandchildren, Nik "Trout,"
Kess, Taybe, Andrew and
Birch, who will miss their
Oma.
She is predeceased by
her parents, Clarence
George Craft and Glatha
Lee Barrie.

lore for diaries, notes,
photographs and other
memorabilia, and to share
the information at the
gathering.
Some of the early-day
Scottish settlers in the
area included such names
as Dunbar, Rattray, Duthie,
Hardie, Stewart, Campbell,
McFarlane, Geddes, Kyd,
Patterson, Froman, Dysart,
Spalding, Jamieson and
Marshall—and there were
many more who came to
America after Scotland's
economy had collapsed.
In the early days of settle-
ment in Gilliam County,
an organization known as
the Caledonian Society
was formed by those who
arrived early, to help
fellow Scots still arriving
find work and housing.
In later years, in the
1950s and early 1960s,
celebrations to honor the
early Scottish settlers
were held in Condon,
John Day, Dayville and
other areas where Scots
settled. As the Scottish
pioneers passed away,
the celebrations honoring
them seemed to fade
away as well.
The now 16-year-old
tradition of honoring the

area's Scottish heritage
has the same purpose—to
honor the Scottish heritage
of the area, the families
of those who planted roots
here. The written docu-
mentation of the area's
Scottish families will
become a valuable geneal-
ogical and research
compilation of the area
and its people. Those who
attend are invited to take
a run at the podium to
talk of their family's
earlier years.
The celebration is held
each year on, or near,
the birth date of the
famed Scottish poet,
the immortal Robert
Burns, Scotland's
endearing Poet Laureate
who was born on Jan. 25,
1759.
The afternoon, and
into the evening, is
spent with lively
readings and

recitations of Robert
Burns and other poetry,
music of the country,
the pipes and drums,
snippets of letters
and family histories.
Also included is a
shortbread-baking
contest, which offers
a host of unique prizes,
and an ample supply
of shortbread.
The public is invited
to the event. Tickets
are on sale at the
Times-Journal in
Condon, 541-384-2421,
and will be available
at the door. Tickets
are \$17 per person,
or \$30 for a couple
for all day and
evening events.
The Condon Elks
Lodge is now
equipped with an
ADA-approved
chair lift to the
lodge floor and
an ADA-approved
restroom facility
on the lodge
floor level.

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
