## Critical care expertise is 'here,' when it matters most

While residents and visitors of south Morrow County may treasure its "rurality," when it comes to medical care, we desire the best care possible.

With this goal in mind, Pioneer Memorial Hospital (PMH) has partnered with Providence Health Services to provide 24-hour access to critical care expertise "here" in Heppner.

Through an advanced video system, Providence Telemedicine Network allows Portland-based critical care specialists from the Oregon Clinic's Pulmonary Critical Care Division to be "in the room" with patients, their families and the Pioneer Memorial Hospital physicians, helping to determine the best treatments.

These telecritical care consults are accomplished by means of a telemedicine robot that connects doctors and patients with off-site medical experts.

"In many cases critically ill patients will need to be transported from Pioneer Memorial Hospital to a tertiary care facility to obtain a higher level care," said Dr. Ed Berretta.

"With this service we have the ability to be in close collaboration with a specialist at a regional medical center to discuss what measures to institute for the patient to be able remain at PMH."

If it's determined that a telecritical care consult is appropriate, the telemedicine robot will be moved to the patient's bedside, where the consulting physician can perform an evaluation and consultation in collaboration with the patient's attending physician.

## FSA announces disaster assistance sign-up date

**WASHINGTON** — U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) Administrator Juan M. Garcia announced last week

that farmers and ranchers can sign-up for disaster assistance programs beginning Tuesday, April 15, 2014.

The Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP) and the Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP) will provide payments to eligible producers for livestock deaths and grazing losses that have occurred since the expiration of the livestock disaster assistance programs in 2011. Enrollment also begins on April 15 for producers with losses covered by the Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees, and Farm-Raised Fish Program (ELAP) and the Tree Assistance Program (TAP) in 2011, when the programs expired, through 2014.

Producers are encouraged to contact their county office to schedule an appointment. For more information, visit any USDA Service Center.
