Will be taking applications for vacated council seat

By David Sykes The Heppner city council welcomed a new mayor and councilmember when

the newly-elected officials were sworn into office at the regular monthly council meeting Monday night.

New to the council is Adam Doherty, with JoAnne Burleson being reelected to her position, and Skip Matthews moving from the council into the mayor's position.

With Matthews' move comes a vacancy that will be filled later this month by council appointment. The city will accept applications from citizens, and then choose one later to fill the empty council position. Interested persons are encouraged to apply.

Following are the rules to apply for the position as stated in a public notice from the city:

"The City Council for the City of Heppner has a vacancy in Council Position number one. The current term for this position expires on December 31, 2016. This position will be filled by Council appointment. To be eligible to serve in this office a person must be a qualified elector within the meaning of the State Constitution and must have resided in the city limits of the City of Heppner for one year prior to appointment. Interested parties must complete and application for appointment to the City Council by Thursday January 22, 2015 at 5:00 PM. Applications are available At Heppner City Hall, 111 N. Main St, Heppner."
