The date for the service was set, and the ladies of the church made many plates of sandwiches. My father, hardly out of seminary, prepared a message. And a community and many dignitaries came together to mourn their common loss. And every year in February, throughout his long ministry as a United Methodist Pastor, my father would tell his congregation the story of the four chaplains.

In 1961 the U.S. Congress officially declared February 3 as Four Chaplains Observance Day. And for my father, the Rev. Bennett G. Brudevold, it was always the day when the War had come to his doorstep. In truth, he had become the chaplain that his restricted vision had once prevented
