Housing grant funds available

Recently the Columbia River Enterprise Zone (CREZ) gave an additional \$40,000 to the Willow Creek Valley Economic Development Group (WC-VEDG) to enable the group to continue with its successful grant program for home purchases.

WCVEDG would like to remind potential home buyers that there are still funds available for home buyers in South Morrow County.

The way the program works is that anyone who has a written agreement to purchase a home can take the agreement to Sheryll Bates at the Heppner Chamber of Commerce next to city hall, and be put on the list to receive up to \$5,000 in grant money.

The money is put into escrow and goes toward the purchase at closing. Farmers Home Administration (FHA) loans are not eligible for the grants.

The main stipulation in the program is if the home is sold within three years the buyers agree to pay WCVEDG back the grant

It was previously reported in the Heppner Gazette-Times that the money could not be used for purchase of rental units.

This report was incorrect. The grant funds can be used to purchase rentals, or properties to be turned into or used as rentals.
