

Drivers should use extreme caution and patience when they encounter a striping crew. When possible, the striping crew will move off the roadway to allow vehicles behind the striping operation to pass. Be mindful if you pass this vehicle unless directed to do so. Drivers can avoid getting fresh white or yellow paint on their vehicles by following a few simple rules -Give striping crews plenty of room to work; don't follow too closely

-Avoid driving over the newly-painted markings -If drivers do get paint on their vehicles, wash the paint off as quickly as possible, as soon as you can. This fresh paint often comes off easily with soap and water.
