News from Hardman Community Center

On Sunday, Aug. 30, the Hardman Community Center held a workday to work on the kitchen wall. Unfortunately, as Scott Smythe began tearing off the upper wall, he found that there were problems with the ceiling that needed addressed before the wall could go up, so the rest of the day was spent taking

off the first layer of ceiling plywood, which can be reused. As in the last "remodeling," there was no shortage of nails. Tom Wilson, Sam Martin and Claudia Smythe helped.

The next step is to rid the attic of mice and dust, remove the larger debris, tear down the old ceiling and put up the new using the salvaged plywood, and then put in the sheetrock donated by Mel McDaniel—on the upper wall. The next workday will be Oct. 18 at 8 a.m.

Earlier in the month, McDaniel, Greg Pierce and Peter Kvale had moved a window and put in a newer, wider door and built a ramp into the annex for better handicap access. On the 30th, McDaniel and Bob Allen began putting the siding back up. The door will need to be painted.


