A long-range facility plan created by DLR, which calculated the estimated cost of repairing deficiencies of each school building compared to the cost of building replacement, put the Heppner Junior/ Senior High School as the most in need, with Heppner Elementary coming in second. According to DLR the estimated cost of correcting deficiencies at HJSHS would be about to the estimated cost of a to an estimated \$16.9 milestimated cost of correcting deficiencies is estimated at \$5.8 million, compared to \$15.74 million to replace the building.

DLR Group facility assessments indicated that if the ratio of the combined value of deficiencies of each building, divided by the replacement value of the building, was around three percent, for example, the recommended solution was to leave as is; if it was 22 percent or above, the recommendation was to renovate; and if it was 48 percent or above, to offload the building or replace.

"Deficiencies were limited to a facility's ability to provide an environment that is safe, warm and dry,' said the DLR Group plan. HJSHS's (seventh-12<sup>th</sup> grade) deficiency ratio was calculated at 71.9 percent;
