Mustangs sweep first week of league play

The Heppner Mustang boys' basketball team got two big wins last weekend to open up Columbia Basin Conference play. The Mustangs (12-1, 2-0) beat the Irrigon Knights 44-42 and the Stanfield Tigers 83-65.

Heppner traveled to Irrigon to take on the defending state champion Knights. Irrigon lost several key players from last year's team, but they still have many good players who know how to win. In this game, Heppner got to the basket early and often and raced out to a 21-14 lead after one quarter. Neither team could get much going in the second quarter as the Mustangs could only score nine points and the Knights seven. The Mustangs continued to lead the game at halftime 30-21.

Irrigon slowed the game down in the third quarter and got some good shots. They outscored the game 35-35 at the end of three. The fourth quarter play was back-and-fourth, and Irrigon briefly took a lead. Heppner bounced back to tie the score at 42-42. At that point, Irrigon decided to hold the ball for the last shot of the game. The Knights took that shot with five seconds left to play and they missed it. Patrick Collins grabbed the rebound and was fouled. He calmly stepped to the free throw line and made both shots to give Heppner the win 44-42. The Mustangs shot 52 percent overall from the field and outrebounded the Knights 18-11.

Collins led the team in scoring with 12. He also had 5 rebounds a blocked shot. Weston Putman followed with 10 points, 6 rebounds and 1 steal. CJ Kindle had 8 points and an assist. Logan Grieb also scored 8 points in the game and had 5 rebounds and 4 assists. Caden Hedman scored 4 points for the Mustangs and had 2 assists. Kevin Murray contributed 2 points and a


