westbound on Interstate 84 when, for unknown reasons, Crow drifted off onto the right shoulder and rolled the truck and trailers onto Wedding Tables their side.

Approximately 7,000 gallons of milk were spilled at the site, where it entered a small drainage ditch.

The milk flowed a short distance before entering the ODFW (Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife) managed Coyote Springs Wildlife area north of the interstate.

In addition to other emergency responders, Hermiston Fire Department's hazmat vehicle arrived on the scene just before 8:30 a.m. to deal with the leaking fuel.

Oregon Dept. of Transportation and ODFW also responded to the scene. Milk in water displaces the oxygen and kills fish and other aquatic life, but ODFW assessed no immediate loss of fish or wildlife.

ODFW contacted the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) and spill cleanup crews are awaiting recommendations for any needed site cleanup.

The westbound slow lane of Interstate 84 was closed during the rescue and investigation.

Information will be released when it becomes available. Oregon State Police is in charge of the investigation.
