

DA's Report

Morrow County District Attorney Justin Nelson has released the following report:

-Suzanne Bergo, 31, was convicted of criminal trespass I, a Class A misdemeanor. Sentence of 180 days' jail time was suspended and the defendant sentenced to 24 months' bench probation, to include 50 hours of community service and no contact with the victim except for parenting time. Fines, fees and assessments totals \$1,029.

-Christine Luzette Mendoza, 42, was convicted of assault IV – constituting domestic violence, a Class A misdemeanor. Sentence of 180 days jail time was suspended and the defendant sentenced to 24 months bench probation, to include 60 hours of community service anger management evaluation and recommended treatment, no contact with the victim, alcohol evaluation and Antabuse if medically able. A count of harassment was dismissed. Fines, fees and assessments totaled \$600.

-Clinton Dale Cureton, 23, was convicted for fleeing or attempting to elude a police officer while in a motor vehicle, a Class C Felony. He was sentenced to 18 months supervised probation. His license will be suspended for 90 days. Cureton's total fees were \$1,900. He has another

charge of reckless driving, a Class A misdemeanor. His license will be suspended for 30 days. The total fines were \$1,600. Charges disposed include, attempt to commit a class b felony and recklessly endangering another person.

-Erick Fernandez Marquez, 24, was convicted for burglary second degree, a Class C Felony. Marquez must also complete 160 hours of community service. Total fines were \$500. Counts disposed include unlawful entry into a motor vehicle, criminal trespass in the second degree, carrying a concealed weapon and attempt to commit a class c felony or an unclassified felony.

-Corey Timothy Gray, 39, was charged with resisting arrest, a Class A misdemeanor. He was sentenced to 24 months bench probation. He must also successfully complete anger management evaluation, have no offensive physical contact with the victim, and complete 30 hours of community service. His total fines were \$350. Marquez also had a count of harassment by subjecting another person to offensive physical contact, a Class A misdemeanor. He was sentenced to 24 months bench probation. He will also be allowed no direct or indirect contact with the victim, and must complete 20 hours of

community service and successfully complete anger management evaluation. His total fines were \$500. Counts disposed include another count of harassment by subjecting another person to offensive physical contact.

-Joseph Swope, 36, was convicted for failing to register misdemeanor sex offender, a Class A misdemeanor. He was sentenced to three years bench probation. He must also complete 60 hours of community service. Total fines owed were \$200.

-Cesar Guzman Madrigal, 26, was convicted for unlawful delivery of marijuana for consideration a Class B Felony. He was sentenced to 22 months in the Oregon Department of Corrections and three years post-prison supervision. His total fees were \$200. Madrigal was also convicted for unlawful delivery of methamphetamine, a Class B Felony. He was sentenced to the Oregon Department of Corrections for 18 months. He will also have two years post-prison supervision. His total fines were \$200. His counts disposed were unlawful possession of methamphetamine. Madrigal was also convicted of failure to appear, a Class C Felony.

-Leobardo Jacquez III, 40, was convicted of assault IV – constituting do-

mestic violence, a Class A misdemeanor. Sentence of 180 days jail time was suspended and the defendant sentenced to 24 months bench probation, to include 80 hours of community service, alcohol evaluation, Antabuse if medically able, substance abuse and anger management evaluation, and 30 days jail time with credit for time served. Additionally, Jacquez was convicted of menacing - constituting domestic violence, a Class A misdemeanor. Sentence of 180 days jail time was suspended and the defendant sentenced to 24 months bench probation, to include 40 hours of community service and no contact with the victim except for third-party contact regarding parenting time. Additional counts of strangulation – CDV, reckless endangerment – CDV and criminal trespass were dismissed. Fines, fees and assessments totaled \$300.

-Leobardo Jacquez III, 40, additionally was convicted of escape III, a Class A misdemeanor. Sentence of 180 days jail time was suspended and the defendant sentenced to 24 months bench probation, to include 60 hours of community service and no contact with the victim. An additional count of criminal mischief II was dismissed. Restitution will be ordered

when the amount is determined. Fines, fees and assessments totaled \$200.

-Leobardo Jacquez III, 40, additionally was convicted of contempt of court. Thirty days suspended jail time was imposed, to run consecutive to any other sentence, with credit for time served.

-Israel W. Segura, 23, was convicted of unauthorized use of a vehicle, a Class C felony. The defendant's license was suspended for one year the Segura sentenced to 18 months supervised probation subject to 90 sanction units with 30 jail units. Probation conditions include a written letter of apology to the victim, no contact with the victim, and 80 hours of community service. Additionally, Segura was convicted of fleeing or attempting to elude a police officer, a Class C felony. The defendant's driver's license was suspended for 90 days and the defendant sentenced to 18 months supervised probation subject to 90 sanction units with 30 jail units. Probation conditions include 80 hours of community service. Additional counts of fleeing or attempting to elude a police officer and failure to perform the duties of a driver when property is damaged were dismissed. Fines, fees, assessments and restitution totaled \$1,910.

-Anthony Craig Jones, 33, was convicted of harassment, a Class B misdemeanor. Sentence of 90 days jail time was suspended and the defendant sentenced to 24 months bench probation, to include 20 hours of community service, anger management evaluation and recommended treatment, and no contact with the victim. An additional count of assault IV – constituting domestic violence was dismissed. Fines, fees and assessments totaled \$600.

-Anthony Craig Jones, 33, additionally was convicted of failure to appear II, a Class A misdemeanor. Of the sentence of 180 days jail time, 165 days were suspended and the defendant sentenced to 24 months bench probation. Probation conditions include 30 hours of community service and 15 days jail time with credit for time served. An additional count of failure to appear II was dismissed. Fines, fees and assessments totaled \$200.

-Misty Dawn Winston was convicted of probation violation; probation was revoked and the defendant sentenced to two months prison time with credit for time served and to run concurrent with any other sentence the defendant is currently serving. Fines, fees and assessments totaled \$25.

BEO Bancorp reports first quarter earnings

Heppner—BEO Bancorp and its subsidiary, Bank of Eastern Oregon, announced first quarter 2016 consolidated net income of \$782,000, or \$0.64 per share, compared to \$470,000 or \$0.39 per share for first quarter 2015. Total assets were \$352.3 million up 3.7 percent year-over-year. Net loans of \$284 million were up 3.8 percent from the same period in 2015, while deposits were at \$312.3 million, up 3.4 percent year-over-year.

"2016 is off to a strong start. We are seeing managed growth in both loans and deposits. Profits add to shareholder equity, which is up 5.26 percent year-over-year," said president and CEO Jeff Bailey.

Mark Lemmon said, "Net income is up 66.7 percent from last year. Return on average assets is 0.88 percent compared to 0.56 percent last year; with return on average equity at 11.12 percent versus 7.22 percent in 2015.

"Historically, first quarter marks the low point in our earnings cycle as Ag loans are at their seasonal low. As lines of credit get utilized with the 2016 growing season, we should see our loan volume increase accordingly," Lemmon added.

Chief Operations Officer Gary Prophet said, "Steady growth in loans and deposits bodes well for our brand of banking. I compliment our branch and loan office personnel

for providing the kind of service our customers want and deserve."

"Spring is here and we have experienced better rains and better snow pack across our trade area than we have had for the past few years. We are cautiously optimistic about the prospects for this year's crop, but we fully understand that we have a long way to go before harvest. Even with the drought of the past couple of years, our loan portfolio has performed relatively well," concluded Bailey.
