a very stimulating time. Nothing was ever boring."

She spent some time in St. Helens, OR, working in the Columbia County health system and helping with emergency preparedness, and raising her sons. She later moved to Lane County, where she worked with county health and in drug rehabilitation and mental health.

"It was a very hard job," she says, adding that many of her patients were "unhomed," and she saw the impact a lack of family support had on patients.

"That's what I like about here," she adds. "I see people with support systems, with family around them. That makes a big

difference."

Hamill says that part of taking a rural job is simply pay off student loans—like many people, she has a few of those. At the same time, she says, "I tend to always like rural areas."

"I like working here, working with families, seeing people in context," she adds. She also says that she was told many of her patients would be older—and they are—but she's impressed with the patients she has seen.

"I've had to tell my 87-year-old patient, 'Please don't go up on the roof when it's 100 degrees out,'" she says. "I'm pretty impressed by a lot of these people."

## Boardman adopts city, URA budgets

During their June 7 meetings, the Boardman City Council adopted the 2016-17 city budget of \$31,631,419 and the Urban Renewal Agency adopted its 2016-17 budget of \$2,598,300. City property taxes will be levied at a rate of \$4.2114 per \$1000 of assessed valuation and \$451,000 will be levied for bonded indebtedness, not subject to Measure 5 or Measure 50 limitations.

City Finance Director Thomas Kligel said the

city will end the current fiscal year in a strong cash position. He said the city's focus for 2016-17 will be to support continued housing development started in the previous years, to increase activity in city road maintenance, and to be proactive in the continued development of the Urban Renewal District's projected long-term capital projects.

The 2016-17 city budget reflects a substantial increase in activity over the previous budget year,

with significant revenues estimated in the building department from projected higher construction at the Port of Morrow and from the addition of an Oregon Community Block Grant for the construction of a migrant Head Start school near the Castle Rock Apartments. Copies of the city and urban renewal budgets may be obtained by contacting the city clerk.

In other city business, councilors voted to accept

ownership of a field house building proposed by resident Lisa Mittelsdorf, to be placed on city property. In addition, councilors voted to declare three unused city vehicles as surplus. Councilors also passed two resolutions, as a condition for receiving Oregon's Community Block Grant, which state the City of Boardman supports the Fair Housing Amendments Act of 1988.

The next city council meeting will be Tuesday, July 5, at 7 p.m.
