MCHD buys Windwave building for home health, hospice

Morrow County Health District CEO Bob Houser announced that the district has purchased the Windwave building at 162 Main St. in Heppner for \$122,500. MCHD plans to move the offices of Pioneer Memorial Home Health and Hospice into the building after the restroom there has been remodeled to become handicap accessible. Administration and board say they believe this is a good move to transfer the facility to Main Street and will improve patient access, especially for seniors.

### **BPA** planned outage scheduled for Ione area next week

Columbia Basin Electric Cooperative, Inc. would like to announce to its members in the Ione area that the Bonneville Power Administration will be having a planned outage on May 5 and 6 at its Ione substation. The outage is scheduled to begin Friday, May 5, at 11 p.m. with re-energization scheduled for 5 a.m. on Saturday, May 6.

BPA personnel will be servicing and testing equipment and performing routine maintenance on their substation equipment during that time.

Columbia Basin Electric states it would like to apologize to its affected members for any inconvenience this outage may cause, but says every measure was taken to schedule this outage at the least disruptive time possible.

The outage will affect only the CBEC members served out of the Ione substation. Those areas include: Town of Ione, Ella Rd., Lower Rhea Creek, Brenner Canyon, Ione Gooseberry Rd., Dry Fork, Lower Willow Creek, North Lex and the surrounding areas. The communities of Heppner and Lexington will not be affected by this outage.

## Accessing the jobs in our own backyard

Port of Morrow, schools strive to collaborate on workforce training

Editor's note: The Port of Morrow has experienced major successes in attracting and expanding industrial development in the Boardman area, and that development has brought thousands of new jobs and employment opportunities to Morrow County. Helping local people access these jobs is a major goal of the Port and our local schools. In an effort to better understand what jobs are available, and how people may prepare for them, the Gazette-Times recently sat down with Port of Morrow General Manager Gary *Neal to discuss the issues.* 

"There are a lot of good jobs here that don't require a four-year degree," Neal says right away. "But industry is evolving and becoming more technical so good training is absolutely necessary if our young people want to get them," he emphasizes.

Boardman area, there are now about 6,000 jobs in the different businesses of food production, data processing and energy production, and Neal says these industries are always looking for good workers. The jobs available are many and varied all the way from computer processing technician to refrigeration, cooling systems, electricians, welding

Port, and the surrounding maintenance, energy efficiency, industrial safety, mechanical lubrication, pumps and valves and the list goes on and on—all the jobs needed to keep the wheels of production turning at the Port. There are also new jobs becoming available in the energy sector, with gas-powered generating plants being built near Boardman at the Portland General Electric

"These are good jobs," Neal points out. "Right here in our own backyard we are creating a lot of good-paying jobs and these businesses are having a hard time filling them.' He says that workers need to be skilled and certified, and in a plus to the local workforce, he says sometimes people brought in from outside the area do not always adapt well to the local lifestyle. "I think we have a good workforce here in Eastern Oregon. The kids by and large have a good work ethic and know what it's like to live in a small rural town. Lots of times it's a better fit," Neal says. Currently about 75 percent of the work force at the Port of Morrow comes from outside Morrow County.

## Bryant foundation is 'incredible gift to the city of Heppner

Foundation director Kim Cutsforth speaks to Chamber

The Howard and Beth Bryant Foundation will be of "great benefit to Heppner," foundation board member and director Kim Cutsforth told the Heppner Chamber of Commerce last week.

Cutsforth gave a talk to chamber about how the foundation works, and its latest project, a new sports training facility being built near the swimming pool and agricultural museum in Heppner.

First off Cutsforth explained the trust was funded by a large donation from life-long Heppner natives Howard and Beth Bryant.

She said the Bryants made the bulk of their fortune from investing in Precision Cast Parts, which was bought out by investor Warren Buffet in 2015.

Before passing away Howard Bryant wanted to make sure the foundation was up and operating and, although he did not talk a lot about it, began giving out grants to local groups and organizations.

Under the rules of the foundation Cutsforth says cash grants will be made for betterment of the community to nonprofits, municipalities and special districts.

She says so far this year they have given out \$410,000 and hope to reach \$1 million by the end of 2016.

Although not a complete list Cutsforth says some of the examples of grants given already included the assisted living center, cemetery, walking path, senior center, museum, city of Heppner and fire department.


