Bank of Eastern Oregon, 2016. announced second quarter 2017 consolidated net income of \$742,000, or \$0.62 per share, compared to \$815,000 or \$0.67 per share for second quarter 2016. Year-to-date earnings were \$1.543 million compared to \$1.597 million for the first six months of 2016. Total assets were \$396 million, up 13.1 percent year-overyear. Net loans of \$322.9 million were up 10.3 percent from the same period in 2016, while deposits were at \$352.6 million, up 14.1 percent year-overyear. Shareholders' equity also improved slightly,"
