The issues of illegal immigration continue to plague our country. I have been employed in law enforcement for over 40 years, with much of that time spent in Umatilla and Morrow counties. I am currently the sheriff of Morrow Since I have been sher-

iff, I have been invited several times to visit the southern US border to see first hand the crime issues along the border states. Issues of drug running, human trafficking, the extreme violence of the drug cartels and gangs. I've visited the ranches with little or no border security and spoke with the people that live there with the constant threat of armed violence. I've seen the evidence of rapes, robberies and murders of the people that are victimized as they make their way to the United States. I've attended the daily briefings of the multi-agency task forces which are very similar to our own major crime team and drug task force except theirs are much larger and are permanent. Border sheriffs have an expression, "What happens at the border doesn't stay at the border." All the issues of drug smuggling, violence, human trafficking, illegal immigration and cartel expansion is carried out throughout all the various parts of our country. It continues to be a difficult task.


