#### Several cleanup issues on way to resolution

Two property cleanups the city of Heppner has been wrestling with the past several months appear on the way to resolution, the Heppner City Council was told Monday night. A burned-out house on Linden Way and an auto repair business downtown are in the process of cleaning up.

The house on Linden Way burned down April 2, however the burned-out shell was up until recently and not being removed by the property owner. The city had considered cleaning up the property and then placing a legal lien on the property for the cost of the cleanup. However, at an early council meeting, ownership of the property. and property owner Megan Futter was apparently made and Keithley immediately began cleaning up. By Tuesday it was nearly done. Monday night City Manager Kraig Cutsforth told the council that things worked out pretty well and the only cost to the city was some minimal attorney's fees.
