Citing council obstruction, Lexington mayor resigns

'Council has illegally stopped me from fulfilling my duties, 'Kemps says

In the midst of a recall election seeking her removal, Lexington Mayor Marcia Kemp has announced her resignation.

Citing a council that has "vowed to fight me every step of the way," Kemp issued a letter to the news media (see below) saying it was time for her to "step aside and resign." A resignation letter has apparently not been received by either the council or delivered to the town hall, however legal counsel says the public letter is enough to effect Kemp's resignation. "I am unaware of any state law or any provision in the town charter that specifies the method in which a council member or the mayor must submit their resignation. It is my advice to consider it valid," Jayme Hafner, Assistant General Counsel for the League of Oregon Cities said in an email to a councilmember when informed of Kemp's method


