Mustangs head to state championships Will play the Kennedy Trojans Saturday in Hermiston at 2:30 p.m.

The Heppner Mustang football team has won the right to play for the OSAA 2A Football State Championship. The Mustangs defeated the Knappa Loggers in a state semi-final game by the score of 55-18 at Hillsboro Stadium last Saturday afternoon. A large and loud crowd the team did not let them down. It was a dominate performance by the team from Heppner as they took control early and did not let

Heppner kicked off to start the game and the teams traded possessions. Jackson Lehman then intercepted a Logger pass that gave the Mustangs great field position at the Knappa 41-yard line. After a 38-yard pass completion from Jayden Wilson to Jace Coe, the Mustangs scored their first touchdown of the game when Blake Wolters ran the ball in from three yards out. Wilson then passed to Coe for the 2-pt. conversion to give Heppner the lead 8-0.

Knappa answered right back as their high-powered pass offense was able to score from 36 yards out to make the score 8-6.

The Mustangs would then score on their next five possessions of the game. A five-play drive that covered 65 yards and included a 40yard pass completion from Wilson to Coe, ended in a score when Wolters bullied
