Juli Kennedy appointed **Lexington Mayor**

Denis Lien hired as town recorder

The Lexington Town Council last week appointed Juli Kennedy as mayor. She replaces Marcia Kemp who resigned. "I'm committed to our town and really looking forward to working with the council and community members," Kennedy told the Gazette-Times following the meeting. The mayor position is four years, but she will need to run for election in next year's November general election to keep the seat.

In other business at last Tuesday's meeting the council introduced Denis Lien as the new town recorder. Lien is the former Heppner postmaster from 2005 -2015 and is currently a school bus driver for Mid-Columbia Bus. "He's doing an excellent job," said councilmember Bobbi Gordon. Lien's hours will
