The intent of a motion was to deed the industrial land in Morrow County to the Port of Morrow, and the industrial land in Umatilla County to the Port of Umatilla. Kim Puzey (Port of Umatilla) put forward the motion, which was not on the agenda: "As we are trying to finalize all these, water, waste-water, making sure that the tribes have access to the wildlife area. I move that we memorialize our intent to deed all the industrial property to the Ports of Morrow and Umatilla on respective sides of the county line as soon as the transfer of the depot is completed." The motion was seconded by Ryan Neal (Port of Morrow). Bill Tovey (CTUIR) opposed saying, "I am not ready to do that. I think we need to have a lot of discussion, particularly on the Umatilla County side, on how the property is going to be managed, going into the future."
