

Morrow County has lowest rental rate in Oregon

Rental rate averages \$524 per month for one bed/one bath

"Oregon by the Numbers" recently published, is full of fascinating statistics on Oregon's counties.

Rent Costs (One bedroom, one bath): Morrow County ranks last of all counties with a rate of \$524 per month. Clackamas, Columbia, Multnomah, Washington and Yamhill are all tied for first at \$1,132

Population: According to the publication, Oregon has a population of 4,081,943, of that, Morrow County's population is 29th out of 36 counties at 11,215. Umatilla County is 14th with 76,898; Gilliam is 34th with 1,907, Sherman is 35th with 1,605 and Wheeler

is 36th and last with 1,426. Rural: Morrow County is 12th in the percentage

The 2020 edition of of people living in rural areas, with Gilliam, Grant, Sherman, Wallowa and Wheeler all ranking first with 100 percent of their population rural. Multnomah County is last in that category with only 1.3 percent living in rural areas.

Migration: In terms of net migration (change in population due to people moving in or out of an area over a specific time period), Morrow County is 34th out of 36 counties with a 1.6 rating. First is Deschutes County with a 162.9 rating; last is Malheur with a -12.4

Largest Communities: Clackamas, Multnomah and Washington counties rank highest in the "largest communities"

want to put money in for the water. "The bird and bow hunters are the best (money donators)," Cutsforth said. "Elk hunters don't pay much for water. And they leave the most garbage,' he added. The city also puts out garbage cans for hunters to dump their trash in on the way out of town. The water and garbage are done as a service because of the large positive economic impact out-of-town hunters have on the city's economy. Cutsforth said they must remind some local people trying to dump their garbage in the hunter bins located at the city park, that the service is only for hunters' use.
