

Morrow County Health District is the sole ambulance service provider in our county. This hospital-based ambulance service has been serving our communities for over 70 years. Our Ambulance Service Area Plan specifically delegates this responsibility to Morrow County Health District.

How does Morrow County Health

District ensure that Morrow

County residents get high-quality emergency medical services?

The Ambulance Service Area Plan includes a quality assurance process administered by a multidisciplinary EMS Advisory Committee. The Committee has representation from EMS, fire, dispatch, and local hospitals. Quality Assurance efforts include:

- Monitoring call response times
- Quarterly medical review of selected calls
- Ensuring proper training and equipment
- Recommending service improvements, such as the current staffing enhancements
