The Rural Transit Equity Project was the result of a grant that Morrow County Planning and Morrow County Transportation secured jointly from the Oregon Dept. of Land Conservation and Development (DLCD). The purpose of the project was to better understand the transportation and transit needs of historically under-represented and disadvantaged populations.

"So, it's both a planning and a transit study," said Morrow County Planner Tamra Mabbott, adding that Morrow County's is one of four such projects


