

**FAIRVIEW.**

Miss Beulah Henderson is able to get up again after two weeks' confinement to her room with the measles.

John Johnson of Hazlewood is suffering with a severe attack of diphtheria with a tendency to turn into pneumonia.

The Mount Hood fencing crew has its tents pitched at the crossing of the Rockwood road and is progressing nicely with the work.

Mr. Tabor of (Vernon) Portland has pitched tent and will begin the improvement of his five acres of the shorn tract facing the Sandy road.

H. S. Eldridge of Fairview has purchased 10 acres of land at Banks, Ore. He is sojourning there at present, and will move his family there at close of school.

The Mount Hood Construction Company, under the management of Smith & Tucker, with two steam shovels, expect to complete their work by the 21st. If so, the road will be graded from the Base Line to Russellville.

The patrons of the O. W. P. at the Base Line crossing should demand at once the erection of a waiting room at this point. For people to sit on fences in all sorts of weather and under all conditions is more than should be tolerated by the people of Rockwood. It seems strange that the company's attention should have to be called to this, but it is evident that it must be done in order to get it and done in a forcible manner at once.

In justice to all, the town council of Fairview should interview the Oregon Water Power company regarding the crossing at Peterson's, which is bad, and the company should be required to stop its trains at this point on signal at least, and allow passengers to stop there, as people have to walk a quarter of a mile to the station and then ride back past their doors. In 1875, coming from Portland they are guarded by laden with packages to the station and compelled to walk back through rain and mud. We trust that some alderman may see this and some action be taken at once and the company compelled to give us our rights.

Supervisor McKay has had a force of men opening the Barr road through from Rowens to Barker road, and now is cutting the road from Barker road through the Sena Smith ranch. The road will be grubbed and graded this summer, which opens a new country second to none in the county. Several new homes have been bought lately, the purchasers awaiting the county road to get material for improvements.

The opening of this road will also change the rural route from Cleone office, as Carrier Schram of Cleone and Carrier Chipman of Gresham traverse the Base Line, Chipman doing the principal part of the work. With one mile through the Burns place and Curtis place to be opened it will give a fine road from Portland to the county poor farm and will become one of the most popular roads leading to Portland, the straightest, easiest grade and through the most fertile unsettled part of Multnomah county.

Sealed proposals will be received by the undersigned until 5 o'clock p. m. on the 4th day of April, 1911, for the whole or any part of \$20,000 of the bonds of the Town of Gresham, in denominations of \$1000 each, payable twenty years after date, and bearing interest at the rate of six per cent per annum payable half yearly principal and interest payable in United States gold coin, at the office of the treasurer of the Town of Gresham.

The above described bonds are issued for the following purposes: \$15,000 of said bonds being issued for the installation and construction of general water works and a water system for the Town of Gresham, and \$5,000 of said bonds being issued for the construction of a sewer and drainage system for the Town of Gresham.

The authority for the issue of said bonds is granted by an amendment to the charter of the Town of Gresham, adopted December 7, 1909, by the voters of the Town of Gresham, and entitled "An Act to amend paragraph 22 of section 12 of chapter 5 of the charter of the Town of Gresham, entitled An Act to incorporate the Town of Gresham, in the county of Multnomah, Oregon, and to provide a charter therefor, and to repeal all acts or parts of acts in conflict therewith; filed in the office of the secretary of state February 11, 1905.

All bidders will be required to submit unconditional bids except as to the legality of the bonds, and each bid must be accompanied by a certified check on either of the banks in the Town of Gresham, or on any responsible bank in the city of Portland, Oregon, for an amount equal to five per cent of the face value of the amount of bonds bid for, payable to the order of the Mayor of the town of Gresham, to be forfeited as liquidated damages in case the bidder shall withdraw his bid or shall fail or neglect to bid and pay for said bonds, should said bonds be awarded to him.
