Postmaster Wilcox of Fairview has just received word that on and after May 1st Carrier Schram's mail route will be reduced from 24 1/2 miles to 20 1/2, thereby reducing his salary from \$900 to \$810 per year. Said change to prevent two carriers from traversing same territory and in the near future another change will go into effect, still reducing his route a mile or more or cutting out other routes and giving him a standard route of 24 miles. A standard route of 24 or more miles is a standard route drawing a salary of \$900 per year and after July 1st all standard routes will enjoy an increase of \$100 per year. All routes under 24 miles will be increased pro rata of mileage. Just what the pro rata will be has not been decided as yet, hence, Mr. Wilcox is unable to say what Mr. Schram's salary will be after July 1st, 1911.

**Now is the Time**

Right now is the time to clean up your poultry yards. Lice and mites must be looked after early in April, before the warm weather wakens them into vigorous activity. It is much easier to get rid of mites before they begin to crawl and creep about, and while there is no likelihood of their being on the bodies of the hens. The best remedy for mites is whitewashing the buildings, both inside and out. If the exterior is painted you will, of course, not care to whitewash on the outside. In that case you should paint or scald with kerosene emulsion. The inside should be whitewashed twice a year—in April and September. This will serve you as a preventive against vermin and a disinfectant against disease germs.

**Critical Situation in Mexico.**

Anything may happen at any time in Mexico. Those who are criticizing President Taft for sending the troops to the border should await the outcome of developments. Confidential information from all the disturbed district in our sister republic indicate that there is slight hope that President Diaz will be able to cope with the rebels. It is not denied that the fighting in the northern part of the republic has been very serious, that American properties are in jeopardy and that conditions have become so acute in many sections that women in American families have been sent to the United States for safety. The national railways refuse to haul dynamite for uses in the mines and tens of thousands of employes are idle. It is difficult to keep these idle men from mischief. In many instances the insurrectionists are blackmailing foreigners who own mining plants, on the threat of attacking and destroying mining property of great value. The most rigid censorship of all the news from Mexico has been established. It is significant that among those best informed at Washington a feeling is manifested that the United States must intervene in Mexico shortly unless there be a radical change for the better.—Leslie's.
